Village Issues: View from the Parish Council

The key issue affecting the village is the Dacorum Borough Council plan to flood Kings Langley with housing development.

Residents have now received a letter outlining our plan to maintain opposition and communicate updates - a DBC decision is due late summer/ autumn 2018. We remain opposed to any development in the Green Belt.

Rectory Farm has been purchased by a developer for a rumoured £8.5 million. Informal talks suggest around 80 residences could be built on the site - twice the amount which could already be built on the footprint of the barns.

The developer offered to allocate some of the land to the Council as a village amenity, and access could be via the A4251 creating an additional junction on the Hempstead Road. Of course, such 'promises' are not binding at this stage.

The Parish Council is pressing Hertfordshire County Council for a clear statement about whether Wayside Farm is to be sold, and whether the green belt between Kings Langley and Watford is to be retained.

The development of the Sappi site at Nash Mills has worsened traffic issues in Apsley and on Red Lion Lane, with parking there on both sides of the road day and night. Development at Shendish with access via Rucklers Lane or onto the A4251, would only exacerbate this.



The High Street 'pinch point' continues to cause regular holdups. Plans to remove parking spaces have been abandoned – one option being considered is to cut away the bank widening the road but this is expensive and no budget is available in this year.

Long stay parking in the High Street continues to be a problem despite the current 1 hour limit. Enforcement has not been regular or consistent, however the Council is changing its parking enforcement contractor so we will seek an urgent meeting to

press for better patrolling of the High Street to prevent this issue, as well as investigating additional parking availability in the Nap.

50 years of Christian Aid in Kings Langley

The pictures could be from anywhere. Emaciated child, skin and bones, struggling for life. This time it was a child from Bangladesh, one of thousands with their families escaping ethnic cleansing in Myanmar. A doctor talked to BBC news; movingly he told of how the sight of such children brought tears to his eyes, and it would be worse, he said, if he couldn't do anything about it. Somehow being able to give medical help enabled him to feel that in a small way he was making a difference.

We know that emergency aid and longer-term development makes a difference. Christian Aid locally (and nationally) is part of that work to make a difference to the poorest parts of our world. In 2017 we raised £11,400 in Kings Langley and are grateful to all the volunteers, villagers and businesses who support our work.



This aid is given to those in most need, where it can be used most effectively and regardless of religion, sex or nationality. Our funds are matched by the UK Government on key campaigns, for instance improving maternal and new-born health care in Kenya, Malawi and Nigeria.

We are totally dependent on the goodwill of our team of volunteers, some regular, others on an occasional basis.

Streaming services from All Saints



DENS – support in Dacorum



DENS is Dacorum Emergency Night Shelter based in Hemel Hempstead. It began when the Salvation Army saw people sleeping rough in the town centre and set up a project sheltering homeless people overnight, mostly in church halls, with a hot evening meal and breakfast.

These days DENS provides a number of integrated services: The Elms, temporary emergency accommodation; DENS Day Centre, advice and a daytime haven; DENS Rent Aid, a deposit guarantee and support scheme with private landlords; DENS Dacorum

Foodbank, emergency food supplies; and DENS Enterprises, creating income.

The Foodbank is one of many operating around the country providing emergency food parcels to people in need, and it relies entirely on generous donations from schools, churches, and local companies, as well as donations from the general public.



You may believe that the need for a Foodbank is largely absent in Kings Langley but there are many needy families in Dacorum who rely heavily upon such support. Until now there has been no central donation point in Kings Langley – but now that All Saints' Church is open daily (9.30am – 5pm), you can leave a Foodbank donation in the black bin on the steps of the tower inside the church. These donations are taken weekly to the central hub in Hemel Hempstead, from where they are distributed to the eight foodbank centres in the area.


