Members of Christian Aid KL and TIK met with Sir Mike Penning MP



The call for action on climate change has been in the news recently – there is a growing realisation that positive measures have to be taken now to stop carbon emissions and the damage they are doing to our world.

Christian Aid has been making this point for many years, and specifically that the impact is always felt the most by the poorest in the world who have the least resources to defend their homes and livelihoods.

Against this background, representatives from Christian Aid and Transition in Kings participated in a national lobby of Parliament on 26 July. They were pleased to meet with Sir Mike Penning MP and discuss this important issue with him in the context of Parliament agreeing that the UK will achieve 'net zero greenhouse gases' by 2050.

The importance of good local transport and planting trees locally was highlighted as well as financial

incentive support for solar panels and other renewables. When pressed for details of how the Government will monitor progress towards 2050, Sir Mike encouragingly said he thought an independent body should review this and enforceable targets should be put in place, additionally suggesting that a Minister in the Government should have overall responsibility for ensuring all Departments fully contribute.

This has been further backed up by local Councils declaring a 'Climate Emergency'.

However there is much to be done and it will be for us all to keep a watchful eye on those who have responsibility for taking this forward.

HertfordShire 2020 Year of Culture

Culture is taking centre stage during 2020, as part of a year-long campaign to showcase Hertfordshire's creative opportunities.

Hertfordshire Year of Culture 2020 (HY0C2020) will put the spotlight on arts, culture and heritage across the county.

In one of the poorest countries in the world, where malnourishment and infant mortality are high, the school is in a remote area on the shore of a reservoir. Started by a British couple, Mary and Martin, there are about 200 students from kindergarten to Year 6. All costs of buildings, teaching and support staff are funded by donations, so attendance is free.

The donation has already been put towards construction of new classrooms. Thank you to all who enjoyed refreshments at the Carnival – your support is helping this remote and unique school in Madagascar!

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Parish Plan update

Things are moving on with the Kings Langley Parish Plan. After publishing the report on the survey findings in June, it's time to turn these findings into actions.

The vision statement is:

'To preserve and enhance what villagers most value about Kings Langley in line with the priorities suggested by the 2019 Parish Plan Survey – its village status, environmental action, greenbelt, proximity to open countryside, canal, woods and common, its thriving high street and strong sense of community.'

Four working groups have been set up tasked with working towards this vision:

1 Environment Working Group

 recycling, energy saving, local food growing

2 High Street, parking and congestion working group

 parking and bottleneck in the high street

3 Recreation working group

 access to open spaces and recreational facilities especially for teenagers and young adults

4 Neighbourhood Plan Working group

 planning land use and future developments to contribute to supporting the initiatives proposed by the other working groups

NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE PUMP

The parish council holds a 'High Street surgery' every other month on the same Saturday morning as the local food market, providing an opportunity for villagers to tackle their parish councillors on any topic and get updates on local issues.

Recently updates were shared about the two Motorway Service Area applications being considered at Junction 20 and between Junctions 16/17, the motion on climate change passed by the Borough Council, and familiar themes of parking and protecting the Green Belt.

'It's a great opportunity to talk to locals about anything and everything that interests or concerns them,' explained Howard Button. 'It also provides the perfect excuse to buy some of the wonderful organic veg or local bread and cheese!'

The Village Garden now has a small group of volunteers offering their help with weeding, tidying and watering (at this time of year) and then seasonal tasks, such as bulb planting,



autumn leaf sweeping, cutting back, transplanting as and when required. 'The opportunity to volunteer was made in response to many of the people who visit the garden offering their services,' said Councillor Andrew Hubberstey. 'You can offer as little or as much time as you like; at the moment we are suggesting getting together the first Friday of the month from 2pm.'

The parish council marked the retirement of Gary Lewis after 17 years as Head Teacher of Kings Langley School with a special award in recognition of his magnificent contribution to young peoples' education; the council were subsequently delighted to see the results of a recent County Council inspection of Kings Langley Primary School.

The report noted that 'in all classes visited the children were engaged in their learning and carrying out the tasks set by their teachers to the best of their ability. The children are overwhelmingly happy at Kings Langley and are, rightly, proud of their school.' Councillor Rene de Silva added 'Both the council, the Head Teacher and her staff want all our young children to feel equally valued and safe, thereby inspiring a love of learning. It is great to see this has been recognised by the local education authority.'

The Parish Council has applied to Dacorum Borough Council to write a Neighbourhood Plan for the parish which will consider how and where future development could take place in the parish – these plans establish planning policies and play an important part in decisions on planning applications.

World Scout Jamboree 2019

Two Kings Langley Scouts, Timmy Gower and Becky Harding, have just returned from the World Scout Jamboree in West Virginia USA.

It was the largest youth gathering on the planet – 40,000 Scouts from around 150 countries as well as 5,000 volunteer staff and thousands of day visitors. Hertfordshire sent three units of 40 Scouts among the 4,000 Scouts from the UK.

Bear Grylls – Chief Ambassador of World Scouting and UK Chief Scout – opened the event with each country presenting their flag with music and dancing. At the closing of the ceremony, hundreds of illuminated synchronised drones flew together to make the shape of the Jamboree logo, the map of the world, and scouting emblems. The event ran for 12 days at Bechtel Summit reserve, a campsite bigger than Central London, and Scouts could take part in hundreds of activities such as climbing, white water rafting, scuba diving, riding huge zip wires and mountain hiking.

There were opportunities to learn about other countries, the environment, technology, science, and even to speak to the International Space Station!

With 71 venues around our county, professional and amateur visual artists, makers and designers are opening up their homes, studios, exhibitions and events to the public, there's something for everyone.




There will be presentations of medals and certificates for those who completed the challenge in the library on 12 and 14 September.

Too many issues, not enough time! DBC Update

– Cllrs Alan Anderson & Alan Johnson, Kings Langley, Dacorum Borough Council.

Dacorum Borough Council (DBC) and Sir Mike Penning MP have continued opposing the Health Authority's attempts to waste public money trying to redevelop Watford Hospital when what is needed is a new hospital in the middle of the Hemel/St.Albans/ Watford triangle and, thankfully, the Prime Minister's new health spending excluded Watford Hospital.

The current situation with the Green Belt in Kings Langlev is that DBC will publish a first draft of the new Local Plan in late Autumn, with consultation to follow next Spring. They must meet the housebuilding target set, otherwise the government will take over the planning authority and force the development, as it has elsewhere. The target of around 1,000 dwellings per year in Dacorum can't be met without Green Belt development, so sites have been assessed and ranked to identify the minimum amount of Green Belt development required to meet the government target.

Your Borough Councillors remain strongly opposed to Green Belt development and have argued against the selection of any the four sites in Kings Langley, but it is difficult to argue that we should have no Green Belt development at all, and the battle remains to limit the number of sites chosen.

Beware scammers!

A Kings Langley resident was called by someone who said they were from the police and requested that he withdraw £5,000.00 in cash to assist the police in tracing 'dodgy' notes. He withdrew the cash and the caller came to his address and collected the money. The following day he received another call asking for £6,000.00. The next day he was asked to withdraw £5,000.00 but this time the resident's son was with him and he stopped his father withdrawing the cash and rang the police.

Needless to say, the caller was not from the police and this person has been tricked into parting with his money.

Please warn any elderly or vulnerable people to be aware of this latest scam!



Good news – Three Rivers DC has delayed Moto's plans for a service station next to M25 junction 20, saying the traffic figures were unreliable and there were major problems with the impact the development would have on the road network.

Extra has made an application for a service station between junctions 16/17 – there aren't any issues with that application, so if permission is granted it would make the Moto scheme less viable.

DBC refused planning permission for the large blocks of flats at the bottom of the driveway to Shendish, but the applicant is appealing the decision.

Alan Anderson has been promoted to the DBC cabinet with responsibility for Environmental Services including refuse collection/recycling, grounds maintenance and environmental sustainability. They're looking to increase recycling of food waste from flats and businesses, and focusing on reducing single use plastics – Dacorum now has 150 premises where you can refill your water bottle for free.

Dacorum's four-yearly review of parking charges is due shortly. So far the argument has been that charging would seriously harm the High Street; however, there is evidence that commuters are parking all day preventing shoppers finding parking spaces. If this is true, charging will be considered to reduce all day parking and encourage more people to use the High Street shops – there will be local consultation on this.

Thanks to all the residents who attended the re-launch of the Rucklers Lane Community Association; Mr Stan Bower has spent decades caring for the hall in Rucklers Lane, and the new team of volunteers will enable Stan to retire.

Green Gym workout at All Saints

A Green Gym provides a way to improve fitness and health while improving the outdoor environment.

All Saints held their second 'Green Gym' event on a glorious Saturday morning and many volunteers chose to get some exercise in the beautiful grounds of the church.

'We are very lucky to have a mediaeval church in the village' said Sheila Ashman, one of the organisers, 'and having the opportunity to spend a few hours making sure it looks its best and is here for another 800 years is a real privilege.' The gym-goers worked predominantly in pairs around the church precincts clearing paths and borders.

'It's important to ensure the church building is accessible and remove any trip hazards for the unwary,' added Sheila. 'Everyone enjoyed themselves as they were able to work at their own pace in the sunshine.'

It wasn't all work – freshly brewed tea and coffee and a plentiful supply of homemade cakes maintained the energy levels and replaced some of the calories that were lost in the morning workout!

Countdown to the Christmas Tree Festival


Yes it's that time of the year already! All Saints is getting ready for their now regular Christmas Tree Festival – this year from Friday 6th through Sunday 8th December.
