As a professional musician Tom Billington's outlook was to give each and every member the feeling of being in a band and truly belonging. Over time Electric Umbrella and its members were being booked for gigs and shows and asked to appear at theatres and festivals, in pubs, clubs and workplaces. Their offering is uniquely fresh, energetic and joyful.



## Borough Council update... parking, trees, motorway service areas, hospital money

#### When the option of car park charges in the two Dacorum Borough Council (DBC) car parks in the village was floated recently, a great many people got upset.

Nobody thought it was going to be a popular idea, but council surveys show that there are too many vehicles parking all day in the car parks. If charging prevented this long-stay parking, it would enable more people to visit the village without filling the streets outside people's homes.

The experience in Hemel car parks was that charging significantly increased the footfall in the town centre. However, the covenant preventing the 'fettering' of access to the Community Centre meant charging in The Nap car park was not possible, so there won't be any charging introduced at this time.

As part of their work on the Neighbourhood Plan, the parish council will be employing consultants to look at transport issues and making recommendations to address parking and other issues around the High Street.

On a less contentious front, Alan Anderson announced at the last full meeting of DBC that the Conservative council will be planting 1,000 new trees by the end of 2020. DBC has recently been forced to cut down trees which were dying, dangerous or the cause of expensive insurance claims against the council. Planting more trees than those that had been lost is both a 'feel good' strategy and a big environmental statement about the council's commitment to improving air quality.

The new trees cannot be planted in locations where they are going to cause damage to adjacent properties, pavements, underground services or on land not owned by the council. Nonetheless, council officers have started work on identifying suitable sites where this 'forest' of trees could be planted.

## Unfortunately, there are two bits of bad news:

Firstly, the other M25 service area proposal between junctions 16-17

attracted objections from local bodies and residents, and so Chiltern District Council is delaying its consideration of the application. Whilst this proposal makes far more sense in planning terms, the delay is unhelpful. The possibility remains that both schemes may be permitted.

Secondly, local NHS chiefs have somehow managed to persuade the Government to contribute about £250 million towards the planning of their scheme to redevelop Watford Hospital on its existing site. As wasteful as it is with all our money, we can only hope it helps West Herts Hospital Trust to see that you can't redevelop a hospital whilst it continues to operate. A new hospital in the middle of the Hemel Hempstead/St Albans/Watford triangle would cost far less and be more sensible.

## News from the Parish Pump

With summer days seemingly behind us, the Parish Council were quickly into action at their meeting in September by declaring a climate emergency and committing to reducing carbon emissions to net zero across the full range of council activities by the end of budget year 2029–2030.

Howard Button, Chair of the Council, explained 'We are all keen to get started on a strategy and action plan, and to see how this can be integrated with the work of the Environment Sub-Group of our Neighbourhood Plan. Whilst there are things we are already doing to make Kings Langley 'greener', including the work in the Village Garden, we realise it needs to be "joined up".'

September also saw the first *Volunteer Friday* in the Village Garden. 'A special mention for Colin,' said Andrew Hubberstey. 'He worked like a Trojan to clear the north end of the Garden with paths well swept and flower beds well hoed!'. 2pm on the 1st Friday of every month will see *Volunteer Friday* continue throughout the winter – weather permitting.

As your *Village News* is delivered, the Parish Council will, as usual, be providing the refreshments after the Remembrance Service at 3pm on Sunday 10 November at All Saints Church.

Derek Collins spoke for all the council, saying 'Last year was an important centenary for the village, but this service is an opportunity for everyone to pay their respects. The Parish Council feel very honoured to be part of this commemoration and hope as many villagers as possible will attend.' Next year is Hertfordshire's Year of Culture and local artist Ruby Lewis is keen to get Kings Langley involved on a public art project. At the October Parish Council meeting Ruby explained that it would involve asking local people for personal stories and personal history about the village. The primary and senior schools would then work with her on a collaborative project that would see them designing a mural based on those stories and transfer that design onto the disused toilets in Dronken Lane (by the Bowls Club).

'Dacorum and the Parish Council are very supportive of this imaginative proposal,' explained Alan Johnson, 'we hope it might be a catalyst for other ideas to celebrate such a momentous year.'

## Carnival cash awards

The funds raised from the Kings Langley Carnival in June has now been distributed to good causes by the Committee.

All the money raised by the event was awarded to performers and local good causes when the Kings Langley Carnival Committee hosted an event in late September. This both marked the success of the day itself and distributed the record sum of £6,300 to 33 recipients. The Mayor of Dacorum, Terry Douris, who attended the Carnival as one of his first civic duties, made the presentations.

It was an occasion once again to marvel at the range of local groups and organisations that provide a variety of activities and services to villagers of all ages. Carol Chandler, Chair of the Carnival Committee, summed up the appeal of the Carnival when she said, 'The aim of the Carnival is to incorporate as many of the local community as possible and to raise awareness and money for local groups and good causes by providing everyone with a memorable, fun packed day of entertainment and activity'. Driving to a hospital appointment, my passenger commented that these days many young people go off to University, meet a partner or go after a distant job and never return to settle back in the village.




## Tiny Tots plan Christmas Party




Mark Brazier, KLCC's Chairman, shows the sorry state of the nets

## KINGS historic cup run ends in Maidstone

Kings Langley Football Club's (KLFC) historic FA cup run which started early September ended in Maidstone on 19 October.

It started with a 3-1 win against Barking, another home draw saw KLFC beat top of their league Folkestone Invicta 4-0, then a third home fixture in front of over 350 spectators against more famous Corinthian Casuals resulted in a 3-1 win.

This set up the KINGS' first televised FA Cup match (on BT Sport2)! Only one more win and the village team would make the first round draw proper. However, it wasn't to be as they were drawn away to ex-league team Maidstone.

Over 150 supporters made the journey to Kent, and despite matching their higher league team opponents for 60 minutes the match ended 4-1 to Maidstone. But a great run all the same, two rounds further than ever in the club's history and a day out remember by many for a long time.

KLFC's manager Dean Barker has stood down after only nine games in charge. He was replaced for an interim period by the club's coach Ryan Jackett. The club then formally announced ex-Watford coach Chris Cummings as the new manager and his first two games in charge brought 3-0 and 4-0 wins respectively. Let's hope that form continues.

The KINGS home fixtures in this month bring Biggleswade Town (9 November), Needham Market (23 November) and

ex-football league club AFC Rushden and Diamonds (7 December) plus Christmas home matches against Lowestoft Town (21 December) and Boxing Day against Royston Town. Come down and cheer England's highest placed village team.


