New year – new view!

2020 sees one of the most radical changes in our High Street in recent years, with the opening of St Lauras Care Home. Building works have continued behind hoardings throughout 2019 but now the transformation is complete and the new building, resplendent in its festive lighting, cheered up a damp December and the impressive vista proclaims a bright start for the New Year.

B&M Care's 26th home has been furnished and decorated to the highest standard. There are 61 rooms including some double rooms for couples and 23 dementia rooms. A family run business, B&M Care is a specialist in the dementia care sector and also offers long term residential care and short stay, respite, and holiday breaks.

A range of social activities are provided, including pet therapy, gardening club, knit and natter, gentlemen's pub club, quizzes, sing songs, music and movement, entertainers and piano recitals. It also boasts a spa for massage, reflexology, nails, chiropody, and a hair salon to enable residents to look and feel their best. There's also a gym and a

cinema for film nights with popcorn, and trips out are arranged to the local community, events, farmers market and even the seaside. They are fortunate to have a chapel where regular services are planned.

Freda Marshall 1932 – 2019

Freda was born in Berkhamsted and attended Victoria School, then trained in London to become a comptometrist and worked for John Dickinson in Apsley.



In 1951 Freda met a Kings Langley man, Ernie Marshall. They married in 1953 and took up residence in Havelock Road. Soon, their eldest children Grahame then Jacqui were born, necessitating a move to Rucklers Lane. Then Karen and Kevin were born and Freda stopped full-time working to look after the family, although part time work included cleaning the doctor's surgery in Vicarage Lane and, later, bar tending at the Rose & Crown. As Ernie was away a lot as a long-distance lorry driver, Freda was the de-facto head of household – a role she never really

Diagnosed with ovarian cancer in the early 80's, she faced this setback in her usual way by pushing on regardless. She also went on to beat breast cancer, and then set up a transportation company, NMCS, 'to keep myself busy and take my mind off of the chemo'.

NMCS quickly grew as Ernie, Grahame, Kevin and Jacqui came onboard until Freda and Ernie were able to take a back seat and enjoy semi-retirement and trips away in their caravan. She and Ernie regularly won or were placed in the Parish Council gardening competition. Freda left behind a great legacy, four children, nine grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

Kings Langley Neighbourhood Plan - have your say!

The Parish Plan team is now working on the development of A Neighbourhood Plan for Kings Langley and needs your help again!

A Neighbourhood Plan is a kind of 'grown up' Parish Plan to help define the kinds of restrictions and policies the local community places on future developments in the village. The first milestone of the journey has been achieved – to be granted 'area designation' from Dacorum Borough Council.

The Neighbourhood Plan has to work within the framework of the borough council's Local Plan but there's an opportunity to help protect much of what is held most dear by the village. In particular, local heritage - views, open spaces and buildings loved most - can be protected, so your input is vital for this.

You need to tell the Parish Plan team your favourites: the views that give you most pleasure, the open spaces you most enjoy and the buildings or objects in the village that you most value (up to three of each). Name each one or give a brief description including its location and why it matters to you. If it helps, please feel free to include a photograph.

They do not have to be listed or historic buildings or places - just the things that help make Kings Langley a special place for you. Your choices must be available to anyone in the village - so however much you love the view of your back garden, don't suggest that if no one else can see it!

Submit your choices online at https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/ XTL8VSW or hand them in on paper (with any photos) to The Parish Council at Charter Court, Vicarage Lane, before the end of February. All the places, view and buildings you tell the team about will be included in the final Neighbourhood Plan.

News from the Parish Pump

Peter McDonnell is a popular and familiar resident around the High Street – when he and a number of other residents in Rectory Lane decided that their street could do with a few trees, they wasted no time contacting the Borough Council.

Dacorum were reluctant, pointing out the difficulty of planting trees in residential streets – underground services, potential long-term damage from root systems, interference with grass cutting machinery - and the cost. Undeterred, Peter approached the County and Parish Councils to support the 'greening' of Rectory Lane.

'I was happy to support it,' explained Parish Councillor Alan Johnson. 'It's an ideal location with long, wide grass verges for appropriate, semi-mature trees.' A site meeting was held with Hertfordshire County Council and subsequently confirmation was given that they were prepared to plant and maintain six trees. 'It's a great result,' said Peter. 'Hertfordshire insisted they would take responsibility for the trees but we might still keep an eye on them once they're planted!'

December saw the launch of the Parish Council's Community Award for 2020. Individuals or groups of individuals must meet the following criteria:

 To have made an exceptional and valuable contribution to the community in the parish of Kings Langlev in the last year or over many years

- Categories are: Improving Lives of Residents, Action in the Community, Cleaner and Greener Action, Work with Young Persons, Business in the Community and the very special Lifetime Award.
- Nominees should not have received an award in the previous three years.

If you'd like to make a nomination. further details are available from the parish council office or website, including the nomination form. You have until the end of February. 2019's Christmas Lights Festival was, by common consent, one of the best.

'But it is local businesses, particularly Wilden Services, who provide the financial and visible support which make the event possible,' said Gerry Angiolini, Chair of the Christmas Lights Organising Committee. 'The High Street shops create the most wonderful window displays, provide mince pies and mulled wine, dress up and really get behind the whole event. They deserve credit for the event's success.'

Parish Council hands over more than £5,000 to Waterways Experiences!

At the presentation evening for the village Best Gardens Competition a raffle and an auction were held which together with donations on the night raised £1,215.40. The Parish Council were delighted to present this to the Waterways Experience together with donations from Wilden Services (£1,500) and the National Federation of Demolition Contractors (£2,500). The total of over £5,200 will be put towards a new boat, solar panels on their building and to sponsor a residential trip for a young person.

Politicians of all parties tell us that the lack of affordable housing can only be solved by building a much larger number of houses. It's not feasible to build the number suggested (there aren't enough building materials!) and there are other ways of tackling the problem. But it leaves local planning authorities in an impossible position.

We're lucky to live in a beautiful place and are aware of the need to do all we can to protect it. But we have to produce a Local Plan with sufficient permitted housing locations up to 2036, which is approved by the Government's Planning Inspectorate. If we don't have a Local Plan or a three year supply of housing, or if the Local Plan doesn't have sufficient housing allocation in it, we are not entitled to refuse any developments (Green Belt or otherwise), and we risk having to include a larger housing allocation.

The Borough has been negotiating with the Government over the major extension of Hemel Hempstead to the north and east which, with more than three years' supply of housing, has enabled the delay of the Local Plan. This reduces the pressure on the rest of the Borough, with the hope that our overall allocation may be reduced.

Contrary to claims made in the latest *Green Belt Matters* newsletter, we aren't in a position to tell the Government we can't meet their allocation, nor have we been 'maximising' our allocation.

Residents are worried about the development of Rectory Farm, but the development of that whole site was included in the *Issues and Options* consultation in 2017 so it should not be a surprise. The Kings Langley village poll demonstrates opposition to Green Belt development in the whole

parish, not specifically at Rectory Farm, and actually this is a relatively small development compared to other threats in the parish. Unfortunately. in the prioritisation exercise of Green Belt in the borough, Rectory Farm was very low as it is enclosed and would not extend the village further than already exists at Coniston Road, and the numbers are such that even a lower housing allocation of 400–600–750 per year, never mind the daft 1,025 target, can't be met without Rectory Farm. The rest of the Borough is in the same position, and it wasn't possible to argue that Kings Langley alone should have no development.

I've spent twenty years fighting the development of Rectory Farm, but now I am forced to admit there isn't anything anybody could do about it. So my focus has switched to the achievable prevention of the larger sites at Shendish and Wayside Farm, and to controlling permitted development. I'm endeavouring to ensure that the Rectory Farm development sticks to the masterplan shown at the recent exhibition, as it is in keeping with the rest of the village, has an unprecedented amount of parking, and will prevent high rise flats.

You may be interested to know that the Rectory Farm developer has replaced the care home with 19 homes. – Councillor Alan Anderson, Kings Langley, Dacorum Borough Council.




