The village flower beds and troughs are full of colour once again, dispelling the gloom of the lockdown. Village News caught up with our warden Paul Savin planting out the Great Park flower beds and Alison from Sunnyside Rural Trust planting up one of the troughs with beautiful flowers from their nurseries.

Sunnyside Rural Trust is a charity and social enterprise based across three sites in Hemel Hempstead, Berkhamsted and Northchurch offering training and work experience for vulnerable people, helping them to acquire skills in a number of rural activities. These include beekeeping, looking after chickens, growing a wide range of plants and produce, landscaping and garden maintenance.

Next to the nursery is the Sunnyside Up café their outdoor seating is very popular with passers-by along the canal. The café provides Sunnyside The Sunnyside Hemel Food Garden is located off two Waters Road behind the K2 indian restaurant and adjacent to the canal. The team there grow and sell fresh produce in their farm shop, promoting local organic and fair-trade food as well as their own eggs and honey.

Sunnyside has the contract with Dacorum Borough Council to grow 90,000 plants for the flower beds around the borough, which includes the beds and troughs along Kings Langley High Street.

A profile of Rev. Matthew Cooper



We caught up with Rev Matthew Cooper, Minister at Christ Church Baptist in The Nap, to find out a bit more about him. Here's what he told us...

I have lived and worked in the village for almost 14 years as the minister at Christ Church Baptist. Before this I was minister at a Baptist Church near Rugby in Warwickshire. I grew up on the outskirts of Slough and knew Watford quite well but don't recall ever having been to Kings Langley before hearing that the church was looking for a new minister.

I love the community atmosphere of Kings Langley, the rural feel which is great for my walks and also that it is so quick and easy to get into London.

As I was growing up, Sundays were for sport and not church. My dad was the sports editor on the local newspaper and so if we weren't taking part we were more than likely watching a match or game somewhere. In our midteens my brothers and I realised there were more girls in church than on the sports field. That was the start of me attending the local C of E church and thinking about spiritual matters.

I ended up as a Baptist minister for a few simple reasons. For me it's important that in Baptist Churches we don't baptize anyone until they are old enough to make their own decision about it. I like that Baptist Churches are well established, growing out of the Reformation along with other protestant denominations; yet that we do not place too much emphasis on tradition.

Charlotte and I have two adult children and, although growing up in the church is not always easy with the spotlight on you, the church here has always been very supportive. Apart from not having to commute, I enjoy that my days and weeks are varied and often unpredictable. The part of my job that I enjoy most though is exploring the Bible with people.

During the COVID-19 lockdown we have been keeping in touch with one another, especially older members. Of course, encouraging people to look out for neighbours and, if they weren't already, to sign up to help with Good Neighbours. Services and other activities have moved online both to maintain normality and to make sense of this strange time.

I've been asked to say something surprising about myself. Perhaps, given the popular myth that science and religion are opposites, it is my love for both science and philosophy that will be surprising to some!

All Saints: Lockdown and beyond

Lockdown has forced All Saints online – broadcasting services at 9.30am on Sunday morning and during the week on Facebook and YouTube – while continuing to offer pastoral care to the community.

And the easing of the restrictions hasn't translated into a straightforward 'back to normal' for the church, which is now offering new things as part of their community support.

Since 15 June the church has been open every day 9.30am – 5pm for private prayer. All are welcome to spend time there in prayer or quiet reflection, with signs and reminders to help you visit safely and hand sanitizer at the doors.

The church has started an 'open table' unattended Foodbank (*above*) at the back of the church. Anyone finding themselves in need of provisions should feel able to go into All Saints and help themselves to what they need. If you can donate to the foodbank then items of non-perishable food and toiletries would be welcome and can be left in the basket provided. Surplus donations will be sent on to DENS Dacorum foodbank.

All Saints is also offering a 'buddy system' to the community – if you are isolated or in need of a friendly chat with someone on a regular basis then please call or email the Vicarage (details below) to be linked up with a volunteer. If you need practical help contact Kings Langley Good Neighbours (klana.org or 07790 668672).

By the time you read this it is possible that (small) public services will be allowed in churches but these may look different due to social distancing. All Saints would be pleased to hear from anyone who would like to have a child christened, celebrate a wedding, or say farewell to a loved one with a funeral service in the beautiful building. Sunday worship will continue to be broadcast online even after the return to church for those who want to join in from home at a convenient time. More details online.

Finally, the parish church needs your help to continue to be there to support the community – it costs £1,450 a week to keep the church running and look after the building, usually met through regular giving, hiring out the hall and fundraising events. These last two haven't been possible recently and may not be for some time. If you are able to donate to All Saints it would be much appreciated – scan the QR code here to donate.

Volunteers approached neighbours (at a safe distance!), and contributions were received through the local 'Just Giving' site and directly to Christian Aid.

The United Service, which was to be held at All Saints, became a 'virtual' one and was led by Father James, with input from local church members. The main speaker was Deborah Auty, Head of Communications at Christian Aid, and after the main part of the service she participated in a Zoom question and answer session.

There were some challenging questions, how is it that a third of the world's population don't have access to soap and clean water? Why is it that 7,500 children under the age of 5 die every day from preventable diseases for which we already have treatments and vaccines?

There is much to be done but all those who shared in this Christian Aid Week are part of meeting these needs.

NHS Scrubs

Back in April as the coronavirus spread, hospitals and medical facilities found themselves struggling to get hold of personal protective

protective equipment (PPE) including scrubs – clothing worn by those involved in patient care in hospitals.

In response, professional and home seamstresses found an outlet for their talents; a Hemel group was coordinated by TV costume designer Lucia Smith who was linking with Downton Abbey costume designer Dulcie Scott raising money for fabric, getting it cut into sets of scrubs – tunics and trousers – and despatching them to groups around the country.

Lucia liaised with Watford Hospital and with Watford FC who offered to collect and wash the scrubs (they have to withstand commercial laundering at 60 degrees). A small local group was formed through Kings Langley Matters; Ann Johnson, Carol Preston, Charlotte and Felicity Lopez, Alison Williamson, Glenda Seal, Deborah Sherring and other helpers got together and, with sewing machines revving, the group started to sew – working safely, hygienically (and rather magically) within lockdown guidelines.

They purchased six rolls of fabric for about 60 scrubs sets, plus the necessary haberdashery, and received donations of bedding. 'I'm surprised anyone had any bedding left locally' said Glenda. In addition, donated sheets and pillowcases were sent direct to Watford FC, who converted directors' boxes into hospital staff bedrooms.

On the day sewing was to start, the group's cutter Wendy Knight fell ill. Fortunately, a call to Kings Langley School solved the problem, with staff offering help and the use of facilities including a large table for cutting. School tech staff helped work out a sewing production line, catering staff kept people fed, and an additional eight rolls of fabric were funded by the school. Two new sewers Elizabeth Farrer and Janet Hobby joined the group.

By the end of May the Kings Langley group had delivered 230 scrubs sets plus 25 scrub trousers to Watford Hospital, The Nap Surgery, local nurses and physios! 'We are so proud to have done our bit to support the NHS and the local health services,' added Glenda. 'They help care for and support us, doing such an amazing and selfless job of looking after us all during this time.' Ann Johnson concurred 'It has given us a focus and we have all felt our skills, learnt over many years, have been put to worthwhile use.'

Victory in Japa

Whilst VE Day was celebrated parties and dancing in the str VJ Day on 16 August 1945 the mood was rather quieter.

A Victory Bonus was paid to employees of John Dickinson in September 1945 for their loyal service during the war period. On VE Day the All Saints church bells were rung by four of the bell ringers who had performed the same duty at the end of the First World War. It will be good to hear the bells again once the Covid-19 restrictions are lifted!

Last edition we shared news of the death of Keith Johnson, a much-loved resident who had spent his life in the village. A few years ago Keith collaborated with Chris Pettit to make a film of his memories of the village in wartime.

Chris tells us 'I had known Keith since I moved to the village 35 years ago and was aware of his *Old Timer* pieces in the old

Poppy fields prove popular



Many people in the village have discovered the California wild poppy field, just along the road from Langleybury Farm near the flyover over the M25 spur road.

The field belongs to The Grove, and Estate and Golf Course Manager Phillip Chiverton, who is responsible for cultivating the field, decided to sow some wildflower seeds last year and this is the result.

In his words 'The area was a rough bit of land left over from NATO and was very bare. A quick run around with a rotator lightly touching the surface, a levelling bar and then overseeding at four grams per m² and then nature did the rest. With a mild wet winter and a ton of rain until now the results are better than we could ever expected. The wildflower mix are annuals so we will be doing more in the Autumn.'

California poppy, (Eschscholzia californica), is a plant of the poppy family, native to the southwestern United States and northern Mexico. It has become naturalized in parts of southern Europe, Asia, and Australia.

Depending on conditions, California poppies flower from February to September, and horticultural varieties include tall, dwarf, double, and single.

They are annual plants with feathery gray-green foliage and the four-petaled flowers, on 20 – 30cm stems ranging from cream, in the wild, to various shades of red and pink.



Community Choir welcomes the sun

May's record-breaking sunshine was timed to perfection for Kings Langley Community Choir as members completed their first lockdown recording, The Beatles' *Here Comes The Sun.* Posted on YouTube, the recording was seen more than two thousand times in the first twenty-four hours.

Dacorum's Climate Change Strategy & Action Plan

As much as the focus has been on people and the economy lately, Dacorum Borough Council has still been able to implement its Climate Change Strategy & Action Plan, in association with the Association of Public Sector Excellence

The four key themes are:

- 1. Much work has been done in reducing electricity, gas and water usage, but more is needed. Sourcing energy from more sustainable methods to reduce our carbon footprint has begun.
- 2. In developing a new Local Plan to steer the development of the borough to 2036, the council is well placed to ensure that environmental sustainability is maximised in future developments, e.g. solar panel use, thermal insulation, and tree planting.
- **3.** There is a commitment to increasing the biodiversity of our area, to help the flora and fauna potentially affected by climate change.
- **4.** More direct action is planned, including asking the public to help plant 1,000 trees this Autumn (social distancing permitting), and possible investment in sustainable power generation or CO2 reduction methods.

The borough council can only act on things they control or influence, and as a result of the social and economic impact of the Covid-19 crisis, actions must be affordable. However, they are committed to practical, proportionate, cost-effective, and non-counter-productive actions to benefit everyone in the borough.

News from the parish pump Given the current pandemic, it's

Given the current pandemic, it's no surprise that there is more use of all our open spaces, bringing, unfortunately, increased litter, complaints, anti-social behaviour and vandalism.

The Parish Council is working hard to respond, including reintroducing the monthly litter pick at the end of June.

Many residents have been walking the paths through the woods around Kings Langley Common while self-isolating and are concerned that some are 'blocked'. However, Dacorum Borough Council explain that they do not clear all obstructions from these smaller informal pathways unless they are unsafe, promoting the sense of being in a woodland, away from urban life. There is a program to check safety in these areas and to rectify if needed.

On the 'green theme' work continues in the Village Garden with plants, shrubs and trees being added to provide more variety and colour. 'We have been very lucky,' explained Parish Warden Paul Savin, 'John Bailey donated some delightful roses, and Dave Hunt and Paul Wallis donated an array of amazing trees.' The weather has meant the Village Garden is a haven to sit in the shade or stroll around the footpath, and for children, there is an opportunity to run around, trying to avoid the sprinkler!

Finally, the Parish Council has been looking to the future or, at least, at different versions of the future. The regular monthly volunteer mornings in the Village Garden on the first Friday has recommenced and Parish Council meetings have re-started, albeit virtually. There is uncertainty about the Christmas Lights Festival given the current environment.

The proposal to provide an online directory of activities and businesses gathers pace, with a dedicated email address set up for village societies, clubs, charities and businesses to send details of what they do, when, and a contact point for enquiries. July Local Produce Market in the village garden

The market is keen to restart to provide access to fresh, local produce again and the aim is to restart on Saturday 18 July, with nearly all the stallholders ready to return.

Unfortunately it's not feasible to keep customers and stallholders safe in the normal location on the High Street due to width constraints, but the Parish Council have kindly offered the use of the Village Garden until the virus situation improves.

This will enable a one-way system and plenty of space for social distancing around the stalls.

When the virus situation improves and a return to the High Street is possible, it will be posted on noticeboards and social media.

The Village Garden is next to All Saints' church and opposite the Rose & Crown.

Rectory Farm stays green!

The planning application for 89 residential units on Rectory Farm, including 34 on the Green Belt, has been withdrawn.

Gary Ansell, Chair of Kings Langley and District Residents Association, was quick to praise villagers: 'In total there were 181 objections on the Dacorum planning portal, with only 5 responses supporting the development; there were also 443 emails opposing the application. This reflects the vote opposing green belt development in the village in the Parish Poll three years ago.'

It was not just the level of opposition and the inappropriate development on the Green Belt that were factors: both Hertfordshire Highways and the Local Flood Authority raised a number of objections to the application, including the new junction on the Hempstead Road and the risk of flooding.

There were also concerns raised by Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust, the Environment Agency and the Canal and Rivers Trust.



'This is brilliant news for villagers and demonstrates that local people can make a difference and that every individual can influence decisionmaking at every level,' added Gary. 'We will continue to fight to protect Rectory Farm and other Green Belt sites as attempts to build large developments on these sites will re-surface in the Local Plan. This is not because we are opposed to housing developments, but because we are opposed to the loss of Green Belt. Recent weeks have shown how important our green spaces are and their future must be safeguarded for our children.'


The Residents Association were quick to point out it is not just development in the village which local people should be concerned about, with the potential of seven developments just across the canal adding nearly 300 properties

to the area before the formal house building plans of Dacorum or Three Rivers are published.

'Where are the additional residents going to look for shopping, schools, healthcare services, parking? There is no additional infrastructure planned for Kings Langley to support any of this.' added Gary. 'The reason people love this village is because they enjoy the green spaces and relaxed atmosphere.'

Recently *Volunteers Week* was celebrated nationally, and Kings Langley would certainly endorse the plaudits given as Good Neighbours was almost overwhelmed by the local response to their plea for volunteers!

There are now over 50 helpers willing to be called upon at short notice to pick up prescriptions from Boots or collect and deliver bags of essential shopping items. To date over 200 prescriptions have been delivered and at least 150 shopping journeys accomplished!

The normal Good Neighbours service of taking clients to hospital and other medical appointments has been suspended due to social distancing rules, but it is hoped to resume that service as soon as the current restrictions are lifted and volunteers feel comfortable responding.

Volunteers knocking on the door of clients to deliver shopping ponder on how the payment for the shopping will be handed over without getting too close... at one house as the door opened a metal 'grabber' poked out clutching just the correct amount! One volunteer announced that she takes a tray with her to span the distance for giving and receiving items on a doorstep. Another volunteer said 'I have been to areas of the village I didn't know existed'!

Good Neighbours and their clients are very grateful to all the volunteers and take this opportunity to say a very big 'Thank you' on behalf of everyone.

The digital *Summer Reading Challenge* is here. Organised by the Reading Agency, this year's challenge started on 5 June, giving children 13 weeks to get involved.


