Langley Arts and Craft Society (KLACS) transformed Kings Langley into a pseudo-coastal town, KLACSton-onsea. With a myriad of rainbow fish, dolphins, mermaids, beach-huts, sun-bathers and postcard correspondence, fun and frivolity was introduced in the High Street.

The summer yarn-bombing project was the result of many months of creative work by the talented members, each deciding how they could best portray the sea-side theme. The final planning phase was during lockdown, so was conducted via a series of online video meetings.

It was the ideal stimulus to keep spirits uplifted as everyone rushed to add the finishing touches to their work – dorsal fins were sewn onto whales, pieces of gold were added to the treasure chest, wispy clouds were painted onto seascapes and sign-off greetings written onto A4 postcards. The display is different from previous years as it is based around 20 large panels, some knitted, some painted and a few mixed media.

Panels include underwater vistas, rock pools, beach scenes and cheeky postcard pictures, and the bus shelters are festooned in fishing nets containing a shoal of knitted

fish, along with dolphins, squid, octopuses, crabs and seaweed. An occasional arctic tern perched atop the railings, but not to worry, they weren't the

type to eat your ice-cream.

KLACS feel that the seaside theme has never been more appropriate, given the strange



times we're living in, with many people unable to visit the actual seaside. They hope it cheered up the High Street for those who work and shop there, and evoked treasured memories spent on the lovely beaches of the UK.

After a thorough survey of all 46 libraries in the county, Hertfordshire County Council have approved several libraries as Covid-secure and ready for reopening to the public, offering limited browsing, while work continues on the rest.

Keep up to date with library reopening plans at www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/ *libraries* or call **0300 123 4049** as things are changing guickly.

There are limited services at Abbots Langley library, and Berkhamsted and Hemel Hempstead are offering Ready Read packs which can be collected from the library entrance – order online or call the number above. When your *Village News* was printed this there was no news about Kings Langley library reopening date, but items currently on loan will have their borrowing period extended.

During the pandemic the library service has added many more titles to its online offering, with online usage almost tripling compared to the same period last year. If you have not already done so it is easy to download RBDigital, PressReader and BorrowBox - try it, you may be converted.

Many people are missing the local library for the services and for the social aspects it provides – everyone looks forward to hearing some reopening news very soon!

In first place – number 1 in a field of one – and faster by one minute!

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Planning granted at busy crossroads

The offices at no.1 Hempstead Road, at the junction of Vicarage Lane and the High Street, have been empty for some time.

On the face of it, proposals to bring the building back into use are good news, however the proposal that has just been agreed by Dacorum, against the objections of the Parish Council and most local residents, is for a 40-place day nursery (operating 7am to 7pm) with 'drop off' access from Vicarage Lane very near the junction.

Concerns raised about the proposal included the high number of parents likely to drive to the nursery, the time taken to drop-off a child with very limited parking on-site, the lack of nearby parking and the impact of this on the existing traffic at busy times of the day being likely to cause gridlock.

'One wonders how long parents and carers will want to leave their children at this nursery given the problems they will experience every day,' said Parish Councillor Alan Johnson. 'I am also concerned at the additional risk primary and secondary school children will face with cars pulling across the only pavement on this part of Vicarage Lane.

'To hear planning officers and Herts Highways providing assurances that

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this proposal would not generate the problems local people described was disappointing,' added Alan. 'However, suggesting that the parking restrictions will be enforced and space would be available in the village's two car parks stretched credulity beyond belief.'

Near miss for Wayside Farm

Charlie Wray has farmed in Kings Langley for more than 40 years as a tenant farmer on land owned by Hertfordshire County Council, with his herd of beautiful Jersey cows requiring milking twice a day, every day, come rain or shine or Covid-19.

This year has been tough – Charlie came within an hour of having to discard a full 2,500 litre tank of milk when lockdown closed his usual distribution network, which would have been very distressing.

With the hospitality sector, coffee shops, and airlines all locked down, there was nowhere to sell the milk that the cows still produce regardless. As it is, the price of milk has plummeted and at one point Charlie was only getting 12p a litre which just isn't sustainable long term. 'When I started farming, there were 162 dairy farms in Hertfordshire, now we are one of six left, all tenants of Herts County Council, meaning all the private dairy farms have closed.'

It has been tricky managing milking staff having to isolate, and Charlie is still looking for additional experienced milk hands to help spread the load. He and his partner, Barbara Wright, regularly work more than 14 hours every day.

The Farm Shop selling produce, raw (untreated) milk and other essentials

'The two vending machines have been our lifeline during the lockdown', said Charlie Wray. 'They've enabled us to sell our renowned raw milk throughout, without risk to our customers'. First installed three years ago, they're now both open throughout the week and are regularly cleaned and sanitised. has helped keep the farm solvent but also adds to the workload. Visitors to the farm and walkers are asked not to touch the livestock as the Covid-19 virus could remain on the animal for up to 72 hours, increasing the risks for anyone else touching these animals.

Recently there have been campers on the farm's land having campfires which is obviously very dangerous especially in the hot dry weather we have had, as a spark could set fire to the fields and cause untold damage.

A very near miss was from some sky lanterns which were still burning when they landed within metres of his barn – if this had caught fire it would have destroyed the store of straw used for overwintering



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the cows, caused thousands of pounds of damage to the barn and perhaps spread to neighbouring farm buildings.

This year's hot dry weather has hampered the growth of straw crop meaning stocks will be limited, so the additional long-term damage from a single sky lantern could be incalculable.

Charlie says, 'It should be a criminal offence to let go of a ball of fire with no control over it, landing wherever it might'. A petition to UK parliament in 2018 requesting the banning of balloons and sky lanterns did not result in any legislative changes, but nonregulatory measures and voluntary codes of practice aimed at minimising the risks and driving up safety standards are being taken forward.

Hertfordshire County Council has backed the campaign from the National Farmers Union and has banned the release of sky lanterns on council owned land but it doesn't have the power to ban it across the whole county.

We are so lucky to have a dairy farm in Kings Langley with open fields remaining as they have for generations - Charlie is the current custodian of these essential green spaces and hopes to remain so for a good while yet.

Charlie said 'if these burning lanterns had landed just a few feet closer to our straw barn, the whole lot would have gone up and we would have been finished.' If they'd drifted into the open cowshed much injury could have resulted to these lovelu calves, below with Charlie.



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Are you aware that sky lanterns can cause suffering to, or even kill, animals and livestock? As well as fire, dangers include:

 livestock eating lantern debris which can cause tears or punctures to internal organs

 wires can splinter in animals' skin which may cause infection animals can become trapped

or tangled in debris frames of lanterns can

contaminate crops which are then unknowingly fed to animals.



Wayside Farm Shop has continually grown since its opening in 2017 and is now a popular one-stop for an extensive range of British produce. 'It's been a difficult time, with restricted opening hours and a reduction in trade', said Charlie, 'but we've had wonderful support from our villagers'.

Dacorum Borough Council news

The leader of Herts County Council has proposed a restructuring of councils in Hertfordshire making Dacorum the county level a 'unitary authority' providing all 'local' services and abolishing the district councils such as Dacorum Borough Council.

It's a complicated subject, but the impact would be enormous, and we have been working behind the scenes to try and prevent it, recalling the last time restructuring was raised in the early 1990s.

Restructuring would involve, for example, planning decisions being taken in Hertford, further diluting local people's say on local developments. Worse still, in our case, the proposer has his sights on development on council owned farmland between Kings Langley and the A41.

However, Hertfordshire would be too big for a unitary authority, so would need to be split into two or possibly three. There might be some savings from merging the districts, but also additional costs of multiple centres. Geography would be an issue – where would a West Herts unitary covering Dacorum, St Albans, Three Rivers, Watford and Hertsmere be based?

Unitaries are popular to some, as cost saving and simpler arrangements, but the existing two-tier structure has been successful in Hertfordshire, using scale to be economical where necessary, whilst still being local and responsive. Fortunately, the county's MPs are against the proposal, so hopefully the Government white paper on 5 September will exclude making changes here.

Recently the Government announced some changes to the planning system;

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It's too early to tell what impact the changes will have, but the removal of the requirement to swap housing numbers with neighbouring councils – which had stalled the planning system – now means that authorities in England like ours will have to publish and consult on the first draft of new Local Plans.

The Local Plan has been and will be controversial, and residents are all asked to look out for the additional news on this, available from different sources online. The Council has to follow a process as set out by the Government, otherwise developers will be permitted to develop what they like.

News from the Parish Pump

Despite a restricted level of parish council activity over the last two months, community spirit has been much in evidence.

The volunteer Village Garden morning on the 1st Friday of the month has seen several volunteers planting and weeding during some very hot weather.

'We're always delighted to welcome anyone who wants to spend a couple of hours in the Village Garden, either enjoying the peace and quiet or getting their hands dirty in the flower beds,' said Councillor Andrew Hubberstey, 'Arwen Turner even brought some spare plants from her own garden to add some extra colour and variety.'

The first High Street surgery of 2020 also took place in the Village Garden as part of the monthly market in August; surprisingly Covid-19 restrictions did not feature in the discussions.

'Kings Langley villagers tend to focus on the positive,' explained Councillor Alan Johnson, 'they're obviously concerned about the threats to the village from Green Belt development or the proposed motorway services, but know they can always talk to their local councillors, and it's an opportunity for councillors to update locals on problem issues such as parking.'

The monthly litter-picks on the last Sunday of the month have continued with increasing numbers. July volunteers spanned four generations including Kerry, Cassandra, Marguerite, Team Karen, Andrew, Eamonn, Peter and two councillors.

'It was disappointing to find broken glass on the Common and tin cans on Water Lane near the Canal,' explained Councillor Derek Collins, 'but extremely heartening to see so many youngsters doing their bit.'

Works in the graveyard

The 13th century parish church of All Saints has a large churchyard which people enjoy every week of the year as a green space for reflection and remembrance at the heart of the village.

Both the old churchyard and the southern or 'new' graveyard, opened in the 19th century, were closed to new burials in 1985 which meant that the Local Authority became responsible for its maintenance and upkeep – a common arrangement in England.



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01923 266266/261399 *www.spicevillage.co* Some monuments in the new graveyard have become unsafe, so Dacorum's *Clean, Safe and Green* team were unable to carry out their regular maintenance last summer and, due to Covid-19, were not able to resume work earlier this year. However, in partnership with the parish council and All Saints, Dacorum's team are back in action – mowing and strimming, cordoning off monuments and graves which have become unsafe and replacing the footpath. Fr. James from All Saints said, 'It is really excellent to

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see the work the team have done. We want the whole churchyard to be a space for the community and this is a great step forward in making it more welcoming.'


The Parish Council and All Saints are also working to establish a Friends group to complement Dacorum's ongoing work. They hope that the churchyard can be further enhanced, including a churchyard trail highlighting significant monuments that reflect the village's history, and the development of planting and mowing regimes to encourage wildlife and create reflective areas.


