# Just when you thought it was safe...

## ...the Three Rivers District Council local plan proposes 1,000 new homes on Kings Langley green belt!

'Just after we won the victory of getting Dacorum Borough Council (DBC) to re-consider their local plan, we are now hit with Three Rivers (TRDC) local plan which is far worse than DBC's proposal' said Gary Ansell, Chair of Kings Langley and District Residents Association.

The TRDC local plan has been published for public consultation and includes the following sites for new housing in Kings Langley (*shown rght*):

- Woodlands Road (off Hyde Lane)
   62 homes
- **B** Egg Farm Lane (off Station Road opposite Roman Gardens)
- 893 homes and a primary school
  C Flower House (opposite the station)
   19 homes

All residents are urged to send a message to TRDC that Kings Langley cannot cope with a 40% increase in the size of the village. Gary added 'Only 77 people from Kings Langley responded to Dacorum's consultation; We need lots more to respond to TRDC... the greater the number of objectors, the more TRDC will pay heed to the strength of local feeling.'

Village welcomes new nursery Established since 2006, Flower Pots Day Nursery are excited to be opening the doors to their newest nursery in Kings Langley.

There has been a complete renovation of the whole site, transforming the existing old building into a new modern children's day nursery, where government funding for 3- and 4-year olds is offered.

There are four well-equipped rooms for babies, toddlers. preschool and older children. Two separate garden areas will also be available.



Empty for the past three years, the building at the Nap crossroads has its origins as a timber framed house in the 17th and 18th centuries. Since its earlier use as a Vicarage until about 1960, it has been extended and adapted extensively.

Flower Pots also have day nurseries in Adeyfield, Apsley, Prestwood, Boxmoor and Chesham.

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
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Rain rain rain!

The Parish Council enjoy a good working relationship with Sunnyside Rural Trust, who have provided the plants for the High Street troughs and village flower beds for many years.

When they heard that the gravel footpath in the village garden needed replacing, Sunnyside said they could do it as part of their landscaping service.

So through four seasons of weather(!) the Sunnyside staff and trainees worked tirelessly – with the odd break for an ice cream. 'It was great to see the path gradually levelling out to make it easier for everyone to enjoy the garden' said Councillor Alan Johnson.

Unfortunately, the following week a willow tree had to be removed as the trunk had split from the base meaning the 10metre-long branches were compromised. 'The tree represented a real danger to the public sitting or walking beneath the branches,' added Alan; 'Thankfully Martin Oak and his team answered the call – and protected our lovely rose bushes with the help of three green bins!' The Kings Langley Carnival is back! After the disappointment of cancelling for the second year this June, the organising committee are pleased to confirm that they will be holding an event on 18 September.

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# Work begins on Farm

The development of the brownfield element of Rectory Farm has begun with the site being fenced and cleared ahead of building starting in July.

'There were concerns when trees were being removed from the site during nesting season,' explained Councillor Derek Collins, 'but it was confirmed that an ecologist had been on site checking all the trees before they were removed. One tree had a nest with residents, all the others were clear.' All the trees being removed were part of the approved application.

The 'Kings Gate' is described as a new community of two, three, four and five-bedroom homes, totalling 55 homes. Prices for the two-bedroomed houses start at £400k rising to £900k for the four-bedroomed houses. There are currently no prices for the fivebedroomed houses. 

# MOTO – No No!

Great news! Three Rivers District Council have refused the application by MOTO to build a motorway service area just south of Junction 20 on the M25.

The application had been recommended for refusal by the Planning Officer for several reasons including:

- Inappropriate development within the green belt with no Very Special Circumstances to outweigh the harm
- It would be a dominant, urbanising and incongruous feature, resulting in harm to the openness and visual amenities of the green belt and to the character and appearance of this part of the Gade Valley.
- No demonstration of mitigation of the adverse impacts of the additional traffic volumes
- Failure to minimise the adverse impacts of car travel because of the limited accessibility by foot, bicycle or other non-car transport.

'This is good news for local people in Kings Langley who have consistently been arguing against this application. said Parish Council chair Howard Button.

It is anticipated MOTO will appeal the decision to the Secretary of State, who will make the final decision on the three options for an M25 service area between Cobham and South Mimms. 'We will continue to argue this is the worst of the three options because of the traffic chaos it would cause on *unique bug hotel* : local roads and to the lives of villagers.'

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# A lotta bottle at Langley Lodge Farm

Wendy was dropped in at the deep end when she married local farmer Roger Mead in 1966. With no previous experience of farming, she soon found herself helping to run the dairy cattle business which Roger carried on from his father.

It's not a lifestyle we could all take to as readily as Wendy; early morning starts, long days of milking, cleansing the parlour and yard, organising cattle feed and silage, keeping the barns stacked with straw, mixing feed and helping with muck-spreading, meeting reps. and coping with visits from the vet or other farming officials.

The couple initially lived in the old house at Langley Lodge Farm ('very cold and draughty' Wendy remembers)

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moving to Wayside Farm for about nine years, 'which was handy for taking the children to school in Church Lane' before returning to their present home as tenants

in 1980.

The council built the dairy parlour, and Roger brought in the automated milking machines. Wendy and Roger farmed between 70 to 120 acres, regularly milking about 80 cows. 'At one stage we were milking a hundred cows, twice a day', says Roger. 'Mad weren't we?'

In the early days, the milk was taken via a 'cluster' into buckets.

Later on it was piped into the dairy and eventually straight into a bulk tank ready for collection by the Milk Marketing Board and later by Arla.

Together they ran Langley Lodge Farm until Roger's semi-retirement in 2013. 'We must have supplied over 16 million litres of milk in our time,' chuckles Wendy.

'We've carried on through all weathers' Roger recalls. 'In late December '62 until April '63 it was so bad we could only get up and down the lane by tractor. We would take it in turns with other farmers to gather the churns and take them to the bottom of the lane for collection'.

Stacking bales, loading and unloading trailers was physically demanding manual labour – it's since become all automated.

'Running the farm was hard work back then, but we thought nothing of it – we just took it in our stride,' says Roger

Langley Lodge used to be one of about ten farms producing milk locally but gradually this number reduced until they were one of only a handfull of surviving dairy farms in the area.

However, the selling price for milk never really kept up with outgoings. 'You could only make it pay by producing more milk, which meant buying more cows, which needed more land. You could make a living but never get rich,' Roger declares.

In 2013 Roger's ill health led to Chris Burrows being brought in as manager and milk production continued for a while. However, when Arla, initially a friendly English business, were taken over and expanded by an international concern, milk production from smaller farms became of less interest to them.

Now in retirement, Wendy and Roger keep just ten cows on a much reduced acreage with their calves sold to pay the rent. Chris tends them, part-time.

'Our cows no longer produce milk so they've eventually got to go – but it's plucking up the courage to part with them,' laughs Wendy. Top: Roger pictured on the combine harvester he bought at auction in Tring back in 1964 His very first time behind the wheel was driving it all the way to Kings Langley – at six miles per hour!

In the early days, the harvested corn had to be bagged by hand and manhandled onto a trailer for transporting to the barn. But then Roger coverted the combine into a tanker so it discharged straight into a trailer.

The warmer weather saw the start of the Great British Spring Clean, with the Parish Council doing their bit on the last Sunday of the month 'pick' around the litter hotspots in the village.

'Discarded disposable face masks have become a familiar and unhealthy sight around the village,' said Councillor Derek Collins. 'Hopefully an accidental and temporary phenomenon.' The community litter picks will continue at 10am on the last Sunday of the month until November.

1st Kings Langley Beavers (*above*) borrowed some litter grabbers from the parish offices – as anyone can do – and trawled the High Street, Green Park and The Nap car park picking litter as they went. 'We want to ensure our youngsters have a sense of responsibility for the place they live, in a safe and enjoyable environment,' explained Mary Pilides, group leader. 'Everyone we met was very impressed how conscientious and well-behaved the children were.'

The initial wet spring weather also saw the familiar problem of grass verges being damaged by cars parking. The problem has been particularly acute opposite the football club despite 100 car parking spaces being available in the ground. The Parish Council has two choices – allow the verge parking to continue and try to mitigate the damage, or try to prevent it which might just move the problem elsewhere. Ideally some grass verges could be turned over to wildflowers, but any action to physically prevent parking would need the agreement of the Borough and County Council. Watch that space.

Finally, congratulations to lan Sinclair who is the newly elected parish councillor in South Ward following the recent by-election.

# Are we on the move to a new constituency?

The Boundary Commission for England are proposing changes to some existing Parliamentary boundaries which would affect our village as part of a proposal to split the existing South West Herts constituency into two new ones.

The new southern 'Three Rivers' constituency would include the Three Rivers part of the current South West Herts constituency, some additional parts of Watford and St Albans, and Kings Langley.

The northern half, including Berkhamsted, Harpenden, Tring and villages to the north of Hemel, would form a new constituency of Harpenden and Berkhamsted. Bovingdon would be added to the Hemel Hempstead constituency. Kings Langley would not be part of Three Rivers District Council, but would remain part of Dacorum Borough Council. The proposal is out for consultation until 2 August 2021, and any changes agreed would not, in any case, take place until after the next general election.

## Neighbourhood Plan ready for your feedback

The Plan has taken over two years to draft following the Parish Survey in 2019, but it has finally been completed... well almost!



Behind the scenes a working group led by Councillor John Morrish have been putting together a complex and comprehensive document detailing almost every parameter around future development in Kings Langley parish. Now it's your turn to have your say!

You can review it online at *www.klnp. co.uk*, and every resident over the age of sixteen is invited to do so and give your comments.

John Morrish commented 'We know there is great interest in future development in Kings Langley because we had more than 1,100 replies to the survey and over 500 residents asked to be kept informed about future proposals.'

The statutory consultation period is open for six weeks until the end of July, after which a Parish Referendum is planned later this year to decide whether to adopt the Plan as a legally binding document.

'I really hope people will engage with this consultation as it will help protect Kings Langley in so many ways for the next two decades', John added.

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#### Hempstead Road school crossing patrol a possibility

After significant lobbying from local parents and the parish council, Herts County Council have completed criteria checks for a possible School Crossing Patrol on Hempstead Road near to Rectory Lane and have confirmed that it will be able to go ahead.

Although this is great news, there are several steps which need to be taken before the crossing becomes a reality – including installing dropped kerbs with tactile paving, adjusting the green verge on one side of the road, and installing signage and amber flashing lights on the approaches. These will be carried out by the Highways department and will need to be scheduled in, and it is not confirmed whether the work would be done this year or next. After these changes have been made, a Patrol Person will need to be recruited. Could it be you?


