Sleepout supporters brave the cold to raise £50,000 for DENS

Fundraisers who braved the freezing weather to join in the long-awaited return of the DENS Sponsored Sleepout helped raise an incredible £50,000 by swapping their beds for sleeping bags late last year.

The event was sponsored by Kings Langley-based semiconductor company, Imagination Technologies, whose local staff also took part while a team in Romania watched the virtual broadcast.

One hundred people from across Dacorum defied Storm Arwen to spend the night on cardboard in the grounds of The Hemel Hempstead School in support of the charity which helps rebuild the lives of local people facing homelessness, poverty and social exclusion.

In addition to the live Sleepout, there was also an action-packed virtual broadcast enabling children and families to take part in their own homes by sleeping anywhere other than their bed. A total of 73 participants joined in, including a strong turn out from local Scout groups. The night started in energetic fashion with a silent disco before participants, wrapped up in thick layers, took on a frosty winter night under the stars with their sleeping bags and a cardboard box, courtesy of local removal company, JamVans. Hot drinks provided by DENS Social Enterprise, the Coffee Project, helped to keep participants warm.

Despite battling the unforgiving elements of the night, spirits remained high at daybreak as participants celebrated their collective achievement and enjoyed a much-deserved bacon roll kindly provided by the Rapid Relief Team from Watford.

Joe Dempsie, Game of Thrones star and DENS ambassador, took part in the event for the second time. He said: 'I am always blown away by the passion of DENS' supporters and the fantastic atmosphere they generate at events. The Sleepout is an important opportunity to make a difference helping those who are most vulnerable, while also gaining a small insight into the harsh reality rough sleepers have to face on a nightly basis.'





Dacorum Borough Councilor Margaret Griffiths, who took part (pictured above with the Mayor of Dacorum Stewart Riddick), said 'This year's Sleepout was, as always, a true reflection of the powerful community spirit on show throughout Dacorum, with people from all walks of life coming together to raise vital funds for such a worthy cause.'

Wendy Lewington, CEO of DENS, said 'A huge thank you to everyone who took part in the Sleepout, and to all our partners who were key in making the event happen. This night rounds off an incredible 2021 for DENS, where we returned to live fundraising events – a vital source of income as we continue to support local vulnerable people in taking the next positive steps in their lives.'


Terry Simmonds

Green initiatives – become involved!

Are you a secondary school student living in Kings Langley? Are you interested in the environment? Do you have ideas that could promote sustainability? Would you like to join together with friends to put forward some ideas that could change our future for the better?

• Identify ways of reducing your (or your school's) carbon footprint.

The winners will be announced at the Annual Parish Meeting on 20 April 2022 and will be judged on viability and merit. A £200 prize will be awarded to the student's school. So, go on – put your thinking caps on and think about tomorrow, today.



Kings Langley Scouts selected for World Jamboree

Two members of 1st Kings Langley Scout Group have been selected to represent Hertfordshire at the 25th World Scout Jamboree in South Korea in August 2023.

Around 40,000 Scouts from over 100 countries will attend the Jamboree to celebrate Scouting and to learn about each other's cultures, as well as focusing on themes of creating a more sustainable and peaceful world.

Emily Cummings, who is an Explorer Scout at Hemel Hempstead Explorers and a Young Leader at 1st Kings Langley Scouts, was selected to represent Hemel Hempstead District and Hertfordshire following a selection weekend in October where over 30 Scouts were competing for six places.

challenges including budgeting and cooking a group meal, leading younger Cub Scouts to build a natural shelter and orienteering as well as being individually interviewed and doing a presentation.

Emily is very proud to be selected as part of the UK contingent of nearly 4,000 Scouts and has already started her fundraising, including running Christmas bake sales.

Kerry Harding is a Scout Leader at 1st Kings Langley Scouts and was selected as a Jamboree Leader following an adult selection day in November. Kerry will join 11 other leaders to take over 100 Scouts from Hertfordshire to the Jamboree. Having previously attended the 2015 World Scout Jamboree in Japan, Kerry is looking forward to taking a group of Scouts to South Korea and giving them the same opportunity to participate in this unique and exciting experience.

Kerry and Emily both need to raise £4,000 to attend the Jamboree and this cost includes the sponsorship of Scouts from third world countries to offer them the opportunity to attend as well.


All Saints Reordering update

All Saints' public information event last October brought to life the proposals of how to update the building, ensuring it moves with the times and is fit for purpose whilst bringing to life the building's wonderful royal history.

The overall ambition is to make the Church more suitable for wider community use – no one should feel excluded. It should be a flexible space for different uses – concerts, lectures, wedding receptions, a community foodbank – whilst keeping an impressive and historic atmosphere.

There was a good level of engagement from the local community and more than 65 pieces of overwhelmingly positive and constructive written feedback were shared at the event. Combined with feedback from members of the congregation and local community groups this has now given the church team a helpful pool of thoughts to consider while working up more detailed plans.

Father James McDonald, Team Vicar at All Saints, said: 'All Saints is very mindful of the historical nature of the wonderful church building and have every intention to retain the heart and charm of the building whilst addressing some of the challenges.



'Plans will continue to be shared with the community and congregation and taken forward to the relevant bodies, and plans are in hand for fundraising both locally and through grant and foundation applications.'

Under Paul's leadership annual gender pay audits have successfully reduced its gender pay gap to 6.2%, down from 17% in 2019, and the College has also joined Stonewall's Diversity Champions scheme to improve and boost LGBTQ+ inclusion.

In 2019, the Royal College of Psychiatrists was named Charity of the Year in the European Diversity Awards in the Memcom UK membership sector awards, and in 2020 Paul won the Memcom Louis Armstrong Leadership Award.

Baby Rhyme Time will run on Friday mornings (see back page) when babies and their carers can enjoy popular songs and rhymes in the children's section of the library on The Nap.


A range of further events are cautiously being planned for 2022, including a Zoom talk from two local




Photographs, clockwise from top: Broadfield Farm's colourful winning display. Sue and Kev Penn, of Abbots Rise, were awarded third place.

After a public call for nominees to receive a share of the funds, it was decided that Kings Langley Good Neighbours Association would receive 20 Christmas Hampers for their Lunch Club clients, while Kings Langley Charities (KLC) also received donations to support their seasonal activities.

Other grants were made to the Kings Langley and District Residents Association who are fighting against development of the local Green Belt on four fronts simultaneously, and the Kings Langley Puffaten who received some seed funding to get the village fun run restarted next June.

Race organiser Alan Johnson said 'We have to start preparations for the fun run six to nine months in advance, which means there are a lot of upfront costs before a single entry has been received. Throw a nasty virus or two into the mix and it can get very expensive.'

Finally there were the usual contributions to those who made the Carnival such a success in September, including Midshires Search & Rescue, who provided such sterling service in a range of stewarding roles; Bennetts End Scouts, who delivered a hugely popular BBQ; Community Action Dacorum (CAD), who emceed the event, and all the stage acts who performed – Kings Langley School Band; Revelation Majorettes; Kings Langley Community Choir; Salsa Tropicana; Kings Langley Primary School Choir, Chris Clark, Twisted Cheer and Dance and The Chevtones.

Plans for next year's event on 25 June 2022 are being formulated and the Committee would welcome any offers to help – large or small – as well as suggestions for the day. KLFC supporters rewarded with series of thrilling score lines

The relegation fight for Kings Langley's Football Club (KLFC) continues and has included a host of high scoring matches, 50-yard winning goals and a few red cards to boot. Buoyed by a coach load of Kings supporters, Chris Cummings took his young charges down to Wimborne for their first of three quick visits to Dorset.

This was a massive game as it was played between the two teams that were, at the time, taking up the two relegation places. The match had everything; six goals, a questionable home penalty, a red card for Harry Crawford and an heroic last minute equaliser by Kings player/coach Will Hoskins for a 3–3 result.

That away day seemed to galvanise the supporters and players as it was followed three days later by a 5–0 win over Hartley Wintney which included a hat-trick by local boy Alfie Williams (pictured right). The surge of four points in two games took the Kings out of the relegation zone.

Results since the Hartley Wintney win have been slightly erratic, with heavy away defeats against Poole and Walton Casuals, 6–2 and 4–0 respectively.

Following these, a 1–1 draw away at Gosport Borough who are pushing for promotion, and then the neverto-be-forgotten 2–1 home win over promotion favourites Hayes and Yeading, which included an amazing goal last minute of the game where Hayes and Yeading equalised from a penalty and Alfie Williams scored for the Kings from behind the halfway line from the restart.

In between these yo-yo results was a heartbreaking 3–3 home draw against Tiverton Town, where the Kings were 3–1 up and very much in control, the equaliser coming a long way into injury time.

It's fair to say the Kings need as much support as possible for forthcoming home matches against Walton Casuals (18/1), Farnborough (22/1), Met Police (5/2) and Wimborne (26/2).

Kings Langley Neighbourhood Plan enters final consultation period

Residents still have a few days to give their feedback to the Kings Langley Neighbourhood Plan, which is now in its final consultation until midnight on 28 January.

The Neighbourhood Plan, which has been in preparation and consultation for several years, helps shape the future of the village but it is crucial that as many people as possible engage in this final stage of consultation.

Once the consultation period closes at the end of this month the plan will be assessed by an independent examiner before a referendum is held in the summer when villagers will get the chance to vote on the plan.

John Morrish, the Parish Councillor leading the project on behalf of the Council, said: 'We have reached the final stages of our Neighbourhood Plan for Kings Langley so I would really appreciate if villagers would have a look at the plan on our website and give feedback to the consultation. Lack of clear housing supply favours developers Uncertainty remains about the future planning landscape in Kings Langley thanks to a question mark over national policy.

Last February, Dacorum Borough Council completed consultation on their draft Local Plan, but then voted to defer submitting its Local Plan to Government citing the 'uncertainty' over national planning policy.

Since then Michael Gove MP, Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, has ordered a complete rethink and it seems current thoughts are tending towards urban densification and renewal rather than clear and build. So does this mean our Green Belt is safe? Sadly not.

Planning inspectors from Mr Gove's department are still approving plans for Green Belt development. One of the most significant locally was the decision on 100 dwellings in the Green Belt at Bullens Green Lane, Colney Heath where the Inspector allowed the developer's appeal, primarily due to lack of five-year housing supply.

This decision has far-reaching consequences for councils and developers, since many councils - including Dacorum – do not have a five-year housing supply, ie. enough sites ready for development to meet their housing needs for the next five years. For developers it means there is an automatic presumption in favour of sustainable development anywhere.

Gary Ansell, chairman of Kings Langley & District Residents Association, said 'Which brings us to 21/04241/SCO which is the planning reference for a development between Tring Town and Tring Station comprising 1,400 dwellings including a sports centre, a primary and secondary school on Green Belt.

'It wasn't in the earlier draft Local Plan; it is an entirely speculative development and may be the first of many similar developments anywhere in Dacorum – including Kings Langley,' he explained.

'That's why it is so important that such developments are fought wherever they are, whatever bells and whistles are included.'

Lunch Club Celebrations

Half a century of lunches were celebrated late last year when the Good Neighbours' Lunch Club marked its 50th birthday.


