Village pays respects to Oscars' Russo

Italian flags were displayed across shop fronts the length of the high street after the death of Oscar's Pizza Co. founder Antonio Russo was announced in June.

The restauranter and award-winning artist passed away on 15 June after battling cancer for more than three years. The pizzeria was closed for two days as a mark of respect.



Tony, as he was known, had handed the restaurant to his son – and its namesake – Oscar while he was ill but his eye-catching artwork still adorns the walls.

His work has been shown at art galleries the world over, from The Louvre in Paris to Miami's Art Spectrum, and he was named Best New Artist 2014 and Best Selling Published Artist 2016 by the Fine Art Trade Guild.

Describing his style as 'abstract expressionism', more recently Tony sold some pieces in aid of worthy causes, including the NHS and The Brain Tumour Charity.

Tony was a keen musician and would paint in response to pieces of music – anything from classic rock to rap. A former music producer, he had worked with well-known performers including Pink and Kanye West.

Kerry takes on year-long roller skating fundraiser

A Kings Langley mum who has watched three members of her family battle cancer has undertaken a challenge to roller skate every day for a year in a bid to raise money for two charities.

Kerry Pearson took up the challenge in response to the helplessness she felt after her mother-in-law, Liz, was diagnosed with terminal cancer just months after her father-in-law, Anthony, died of a brain tumour. She is now hoping to raise at least £1,000 for both Cancer Research UK and Sarcoma UK.

Kerry said 'The past year or two has been incredibly difficult – watching people we love suffer so much and not being able to do anything about it – so it was important to me to find a way to make a tiny bit of a difference. My dad has also come through two cancer diagnoses so it's something very much at the front of my mind.'

A lifelong sports enthusiast, Kerry undertakes much of her daily practice in the early hours or evenings which, with two small children, requires organisation, discipline and endless support from her husband, Andy.

And as she gets to grips with the more complex aspects of roller skating she is chronicling her progress on Instagram – something that is proving just as much of a challenge.

She said 'The best way to raise awareness and drive donations to my chosen charities is to record it all on social media but that's harder than the skating. I'm a perfectionist about the content I post and then it can be disheartening when it feels like not many people are viewing the videos. I spend ages second guessing the algorithms in the hope it will land well and reach more people.'

Kerry launched the challenge with a heartfelt video on Instagram, which took her days to pluck up the courage

to film. She said 'It was difficult to be so open and emotional on a social media platform but I felt it was important that people understood my motivations. I'm hopeful that people will be understanding and supportive of the

challenge I've taken on and choose to make

a donation as I continue on my skating journey.'

And Kerry's mother in law, Liz, who is receiving respite care in Harrogate, is behind the challenge – despite her natural concerns.

Kerry said 'She is supportive but worries about me hurting myself. I have shown her a few videos and she says 'How fun!' – apart from the ones where I've fallen and

then she frowns and tells me to be careful because I'm precious! I think she understands this is me doing something to try to help, even though none of us can help her. She used to roller skate when she was younger and retells her skating adventures with a smile.'

Re-engage is looking for guests aged 75 and over to join its regular Sunday meetings where there is the opportunity to chat to old friends and make new ones.

Janice Fairfield, the area's tea party group coordinator, said 'Many older people have lost the confidence to go out since the Covid pandemic, which is why our events are so important to them. We must do all we can to encourage them to come along and rebuild friendships.

'Life can be extremely lonely for some older people. One of our guests, who is in his 90s, hadn't been out of his house for 18 months until he came to one of our tea parties. He enjoyed himself tremendously, as they all do. They just want to mix with their peers and talk about things that are familiar to them.'

In addition to guests, the group is also looking to expand its pool of volunteer drivers to help ferry people to and from the tea parties.

Janice added 'We usually have around ten guests who are driven to and from the tea parties. Mostly they are women – we would like to see more men coming along too.'


Summer workshops from Kings Langley Musical Theatre Co.

KLS boosts its green credentials with new recycling scheme

A new paper recycling scheme has been launched at Kings Langley School thanks to a number of financial donations from the council and a local business.

The scheme is the brainchild of head students Scarlett Mangan and James Deayn (pictured right), and has seen 15 paper recycling bins placed in key rooms around the school such as the library and reprographics.

The initiative was made possible thanks to an environmental award granted by Kings Langley Parish Council, which carried a prize of £200, and a further environmental grant of £250. Scarlett and James also reached out to Imagination Technologies who made a further donation to fund the project, taking the total amount raised to £750.

The money has meant a further 81 bins can now be bought which will ensure the entire school can be catered for.



The paper will be transported to Apsley Paper Mill to be recycled, meaning that not only will all the school's paper be recycled sustainably but, thanks to the proximity of the mill to the school, their recycling carbon footprint will be reduced by over 95%.

Scarlett and James undertook the project as a way to make changes to help tackle the looming effects of the climate crisis. They are continuing to do what they can to make Kings Langley School a more sustainable place and have their sights set on providing plastic bottle bins next!

Kings Langley FC back to Southern Central League

In addition the KINGS have strengthened the squad with a new signing from Hemel Hempstead in James Kaloczi, who will bring higher league experience to the club.

The KINGS have arranged an exciting looking pre-season including home friendlies against Southend United (9 July, 3pm), St Albans (26 July, 7.45pm), Biggleswade Town (30 July, 1pm) and finishing with a home match against a Watford XI (2 August, 7.45pm). The first league match will take place on Saturday 6 August.

A number of volunteers at Watford Social Centre for the Blind have received the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, the highest award a local voluntary group can receive in the UK.

The club, many of whose members and volunteers come from Kings Langley, provides a social support club for those with a visual impairment and this year marked its 71st anniversary.

The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service aims to recognise outstanding work by local volunteer groups to benefit their communities. It was created in 2002 to celebrate The Queen's Golden Jubilee. Recipients are announced each year on 2 June, the anniversary of The Queen's Coronation.

Six representatives from the group will receive the award crystal and certificate from Robert Vos, Lord-Lieutenant of Hertfordshire, later this summer while two volunteers from the charity will attend a garden party

at Buckingham Palace in May 2023.

Jenny Marsh, chairman of the Trustees and Lead Volunteer, said 'I'm absolutely delighted that our group's work has been recognised. Over the last 71 years our volunteers have worked so hard to make the club a fun, happy and vibrant place for our members.

'My late grandmother, Rene Milton started the club in the 1950s and was succeeded by my late mother Susan Harper in the 1990s. They, and I, have been helped by numerous selfless volunteers who give up so much of their time to ensure our members are supported and feel included in our community. We're extremely proud to be the recipients of the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.'



Green Belt grab

Cala Homes has submitted a planning application for 135 additional new homes on Green Belt land at Rectory Farm. Despite the community inducements offered, our roads, schools and health facilities are already stretched, and Cala's proposals will make this much worse.

When Dacorum published its draft Local Plan (since withdrawn) it anticipated 119 new dwellings in Kings Langley over 19 years. In the last two years planning applications for 131 dwellings have been submitted or approved; with Cala Homes development on Green Belt and the proposed 134 homes on London Road, this is far too many.

In addition, Three Rivers have approved a further 136 dwellings on the village border and indicated it will designate Numbers Farm (Green Belt) – currently accessed off Station Road – for 890 new homes.

And what of the offer of 'Affordable Housing'? This is only available to people on the council housing register.



To use the Miller Homes 55 homes as an example: 35% are affordable, so 14 flats will be provided at an Affordable Rent level (up to 80% of the market rental value in this area) with five dwellings being provided on Shared Ownership conditions (purchased by the tenant). These homes will be owned and managed by Watford Community Housing Association.

In terms of purchase price Miller sold 2-bed houses for £500k and 3-bed houses for £600k

Alan said 'I'm tremendously proud and honoured to have been elected Deputy Mayor and I'm looking forward to raising funds for John's chosen charity, Dacorum Community Trust, and making a lot of new friends over the next 12 months.'

Alan was nominated for the role by Alan Anderson, his fellow Dacorum Borough Councillor representing Kings Langley. Alan (Anderson) said 'I am delighted with this appointment. I was very pleased to nominate Alan J for the role, as it is a fitting appointment for somebody who does so much for the local community.'


