Kings Langley Common was bathed in sunshine once again for this year's Carnival, as performers sang and danced, the BBQ was sizzling, the stalls were buzzing and the happy noise and laughter from the thousands of Carnival goers could be heard far and wide; you could have been forgiven for thinking this was just another fantastic Kings Langley Carnival.

But some things were different. For a start, Ian Golding, a local contestant on the TV programme Next Level *Chef,* opened the Carnival and then hosted his own stall. There were also a wide range of stall holders old and new selling their wares or raising awareness of their activities around the village.

However, it was the world record attempt to get 500 people dancing to the 1970's classic Oops Upside *Your Head* which was the major novelty. There were the inevitable worries before the event: Would the weather stay dry? Would enough people participate to try and break

the record? Would Guinness World Records recognise the attempt?

Carol Chandler, Carnival Chairman, said 'We were absolutely delighted that so many people got behind us and that everyone participating had such a great time and managed

to keep in sync! We hope we were successful with the 441 local people taking part and 'dancing' for all they were worth. They may soon have bragging rights for holding a world record, although while we know we had more people than the existing record of 406, all the details have to be ratified by Guinness in due course!'

Elsewhere the crowds were entertained by Revelation Majorettes, the Community Choir, the Marginalia Quartet, Salsa Tropicana, the Primary School Choir, the Dance Place, the Out of Handers and Skehill Academy of Irish Dance. As usual, there was a lot of impromptu singing and dancing along to the fabulous performances from the stage.

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The very cold spell over the winter, including a week of thick snow, took its toll on many gardens across the country – and the Village Garden was no exception.

More than sixty plants and shrubs – and two trees – were killed off in the Parish Council's Village Garden adjacent to All Saints Church.

Councillor Alan Johnson, pictured above, said 'We left everything in situ until early June but it became clear, to quote Monty Python, that the plants were not pining, they'd passed on.'

Consequently, they were all removed, leaving some very large gaps.

Fortunately, local resident and nurseryman Dave Hunt provided more than sixty replacements including some

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unusual varieties of lilac, liatris, phyto carpus, astilbe, philadelphus, euonymus, photinia, buddleia and coreopsis.

A few days later community gardeners Ann, Annette, Terri and Alan planted everything out – on one of the hottest days of the year.

'Four hours in blazing sunshine is lovely if you are sitting in a deckchair with a glass of something cold,' added Alan, 'but not so great if you are gardening. However, we wanted to give everything a chance to establish itself at the earliest opportunity.'

The community gardeners meet at 10am on the first Friday of the month, but anyone is welcome at anytime to do a little pruning, weeding or watering. A further supply of plants and shrubs will arrive towards the second half of July.

The Kings Langley Parish Council Gardens Competition has returned and the Parish Council is very keen to get gardeners of all ages involved.

Councillor Gerry Angiolini said 'A garden is the best way to teach children about the importance of nature – and we want to make sure we have a steady supply of new entrants to the competition.'

The Parish Council is not looking for exclusively Chelsea Flower Show gardens, but for anyone who loves their garden as a place to relax with the family, put their feet up or just like a bit of colour and are not too fussy about its genus.



Pope seen in village

Train travellers are always complaining about late trains and bus replacement services, but the train on Platform 4 has arrived, and it never leaves.

It is part of a colourful mural that includes Pope Adrian IV (1154 – 59), the only English Pope who lived in Bedmond, the Old Priory, built with a grant from King Edward II in Kings Langley in 1308 – and a train!

The mural was suggested by Alex Michaels, a 'station adopter' for Kings Langley. (Station adopters are volunteers who help out at their local station). 'I am absolutely delighted with the result,' he said, adding 'When I suggested some artwork to brighten the station platforms, I didn't realise quite what an impact they would have. Everyone involved with this project is to be congratulated.'

The mural resulted from a collaboration between artist Mark Tanti of Demograffix, London North Western Railways, Imagination Technology (both of whom sponsored the mural), and Kings Langley History Society.



Lollipop ladies remembered

In the last issue of *Village News* we introduced Lee Lewis, billed as Kings Langley's 'first ever' Lollipop Lady. We have since been inundated with messages from those who remember many previous people in this role – dating back as far as the 1950s – and so apologise for the oversight!

We have been unable to uncover any photographs of past Lollipop Ladies, but our enquiries on Facebook's Kings Langley Remembered group prompted many to share their own memories of these important local figures.

She said 'It really doesn't matter how much time you have to spare – some weeks I drive and others I don't.

When you sign up as a driver you are asked what days you are available, what type of car you have and where you're happy to drive to. I don't enjoy driving so I will only be asked to drive locally, but there are some drivers who cover as far as the London hospitals.'

The service would like to extend its offering to take in 'non urgent' appointments such as trips to the hairdresser, but is currently too short of drivers to go beyond covering GP, hospital and dentist appointments.

Karen added 'It's rewarding to help out and it's lovely meeting new people. It's fulfilling to know that by driving people to their appointments it lessens the burden on those that have family, and offers company to those that don't. Plus our fuel costs are reimbursed so there's no cost on that front.'

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Palace Lives explores untold history of Kings Langley's

A book detailing the extensive medieval history

medieval past

of Kings Langley is going on sale later this year, with advance copies available to order now.

Palace Lives sheds new light on the turbulent Plantagenet period in 13th - 15th century England, exploring the extraordinary tale of the once favoured Royal Palace and its Dominican Friary and Church, which stood at the top of Langley Hill.

Written by Michael Long and edited by local historian Scott Hastie, the book focuses on the individual characters involved, together with all the drama and intrigue of the period.

The 180-page paperback is being published by Kings Langley Local History and Museum Society, with all profits helping fund four major projects being supported by the organisation.

These include the current re-ordering of All Saints Church and the opportunity it might provide to run DNA tests on the body of an unidentified young woman that lies in the lead-encased tomb of Edmund of Langley, the first Duke of York.

Scott Hastie said, 'Palace Lives looks to provide an informed narrative [for the Royal Palace] for the first time because, despite the absence of any structure above ground bar the Locutorium of the Dominican Friary (known locally as The Priory), we believe this is a story that deserves to be much more widely known.'

Rectory Farm development decision imminent


A note from Gary Ansell, Chair, Kings Langley & District Residents Association (KL&DRA)

If you thought the development of the rest of the green field, green belt land around the new housing development at Rectory Farm had gone away, then I'm sorry to say you're mistaken.

The Kings Langley & District Residents Association has been closely monitoring the situation and can confirm that the planning application for a further 135 dwellings will be up for a decision by Dacorum Borough Council's planning committee very soon, once Cala Homes has satisfied some outstanding matters related to flooding and the impact of the development on the Chilterns Beechwoods Special Area of Conservation.

This site has been under the threat of development since the last Local Plan, some 20 or more years ago. It was rejected as a development site then but there is no such reassurance now and the KL&DRA view this site as make or break for our village. If this green field, green belt area gets the go ahead for development, then no other green field, green belt land in or around our village will be safe.

Meet The BloodRunners

Have you ever spotted a bright yellow 'Blood Bike' in Kings Langley and wondered about its mission?

You have probably spotted John McCombe who is one of over 100 volunteers who deliver blood and related medical necessities to hospitals in Hertfordshire and Bedfordshire.

SERV – which is also known as The BloodRunners – is a nationwide charity which in 2022 made nearly 3,500 deliveries. As well as blood – which is delivered predominantly at night when the NHS deliveries stop – it supports three Hospices and the HEARTS Milk Bank which supplies new mums with tested and graded human donor milk.

John signed up to join the service when he retired in 2010. Whilst he is currently the only volunteer living in Kings Langley there are many in Abbots, Bovingdon, Hemel Hempstead and St Albans.

He said 'I can often be seen travelling up and down the High Street on one of our four bright yellow 1300cc Blood Bikes, on my way to or from a



collection, and it's always good to get a wave from fellow villagers.'

Last year, SERV received the Queens Award for Voluntary Service – the equivalent of a group MBE – and John joined the current chairman, Ian Hunt, at a Buckingham Palace Garden Party in May, pictured below.

Beer and Fizz Festival back for a second round

After the staggering success of the inaugural Kings Langley Beer & Fizz Festival last autumn, the event is back for a second year.

Fans of real ale are invited down to All Saints Church from 8 – 10 September to sample one of the 20 or more real and craft ales as well as various champagnes and Proseccos. Alcoholfree alternatives and soft drinks will also be on offer.

Food stalls will provide nourishment while music will keep visitors entertained. The event will be open from 12noon – 11pm on Friday and Saturday, and 12noon – 7pm on Sunday.

In a change to last year's event, children will be welcome on both Saturday - until 6pm - and Sunday, with entertainment including bouncy castle and games. The Friday session will remain over 18s only.

Other changes include the introduction of card readers in addition to the prepay tokens available last year.
