think? For over two hundred years the Grand Union Canal has run through the parish of Kings Langley and provided one of the three transport methods though the village.



Over time the railways and then the car reduced the viability of the canal and so its towpath has deteriorated into such a poor state that, in some places, is now unsuitable for the increasing numbers of walkers and cyclists that are keen to use the towpath for leisure and to get to work.

These days, Kings Langley is very full of cars, so the Parish Council has been looking at ways to improve the local transport situation. We commissioned a report from Sustrans, the cycling and sustainable transport charity, to look at ways to encourage people to use their cars less for local journeys.

One of their key recommendations is to upgrade the quality of the towpath and increase the number of access points to the canal. For example, the upgraded towpath would provide a great way of getting to the Kings Langley and Apsley mainline train stations without using the roads.





Let us have your thoughts

We are now seeking to source funding to make the necessary improvements and it will really help our case if residents could e-mail us with your thoughts on how you would use the canal more if the towpath is upgraded to a similar standard as the recently restored section from Water Lane northwards. If you live near Coniston Road, you may have heard about MiniFest@42 - a mini festival held to raise funds for a much-loved member of our community.

Leti Preduca came to England from Romania to make a new life for herself and her young son Vlad, only to be diagnosed with stage four cancer after a routine registration with the local GP. She tried many treatments, but it was Mistletoe Therapy that has given her a new lease of life.

The treatment is groundbreaking, but very expensive – and that's where a small group of friends led by Neli Christophorou come in, trying to raise money to send Leti to Scotland for another Mistletoe treatment.

After only a few weeks of planning, MiniFest – a mini Festival in a back garden - was born. 'We had no idea how many people would actually turn up' said an organiser. 'We just hoped to cover our costs and make a little bit more'.

On Sunday 15 July at 3pm, after a local leaflet door drop, *Minifest* opened, and a queue quickly started to form. 'People were flooding in for several hours, and we counted over 200 visitors, who all donated generously on the door, donated drinks and cakes and even helped man the stalls at busy times.

The community spirit was completely overwhelming. The garden shed became 'Shane's bar' and in true festival style there was even a portaloo on site!'

Local bands *Jonnah* and *McVicar* played throughout the day on a stage made of pallets, Neli's husband Steve manned the BBQ, and there were various stalls and a raffle. Everything was kindly donated by village businesses and residents. 'We couldn't believe how generous people were – when most of them didn't even know Leti personally'.

Over £2,300 was raised on the day and a further £1,700 (and counting) has been raised via *gofundme.com*.

Leti was overwhelmed by the generosity: 'Thank you, everyone. It is very much appreciated. I think you are the most wonderful community and I hope you will come together often to support each other and to share and receive some love and joy."



Planning update

Dacorum Borough Council is required by legislation to produce a document called a Local Plan, which will guide the development of the whole Borough up to 2036.

The process of producing a Local Plan is lengthy and has already caused a lot of controversy in Kings Langley – the initial *Issues and Options* consultation last Autumn considered a large amount of potential Green Belt development around the village as shown below:



The Borough Council was waiting for the Government to set its housebuilding requirement before proceeding, and when Parliament recessed on Tuesday 24 July, the Government finally published its revised formula for calculating housebuilding requirements.

However, the revised formula is quite different from the draft formula, and discussions are ongoing as to whether it changes anything in relation to Dacorum's calculation. Meanwhile, the Council is resuming the Local Plan process, and will be conducting a second round of consultation in the Autumn, which will include a preferred option.

At this stage we cannot say what will be in the consultation, but in the meantime, please be aware that we are doing everything we can to minimise the impact on the Green Belt.

The greener view...

Gary Ansell, Chair of the Kings Langley and District Residents Association (KLDRA), comments on the latest Green Belt situation

You might be forgiven for thinking that it was OK to build on the Green Belt. Equally you may be forgiven for thinking that it wasn't OK to build on the Green Belt. The problem is you get a different response depending on who you ask, and the messages from central Government are muddled.

At the launch of the draft revised National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), in March this year, Prime Minister Theresa May declared that 'the answer to our housing crisis does not lie in tearing up the Green Belt'. Five months later in August, Liz Truss, Chief Secretary to the Treasury, said there needs to be more housing developments on the Green Belt, without really offering any evidence for her assertion and in the face of overwhelming evidence that there are more than enough brownfield sites to meet the country's housing needs with some to spare.

Is it any wonder local people don't know what is going on or who to believe? The assumption appears to be that releasing Green Belt land will mean there will be more affordable housing locally as building costs will be lower. But Green Belt land is more expensive to purchase so once planning permission has been granted developers argue they need to reduce the amount of affordable housing they promised to build to make the site financially viable. As a result, nationally the proportion of affordable units on greenfield sites in the Green Belt has decreased from 100% in 2010/11 to 28% in 2017/18.

But it is not just Green Belt development which is affecting the character of villages such as Kings Langley. Whilst the Residents Association are keen to see smaller developments than those currently being considered by Dacorum, recent months have seen planning applications submitted for demolishing one house and replacing it with two, three or four houses on the same plot. It is not clear what housing need this is addressing.

As part of our continuing dialogue with Dacorum about housing development in the borough, we have asked what additional brownfield sites have been identified in the last 12 months and how many of those are suitable for development. Watch this space.

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Incredible Edible for Kings Langley?

Earlier this year TiK (Transition in Kings) welcomed Sahira Ward – a regional facilitator for Incredible Edible – to their open meeting.

With her fellow volunteers she has created an 'Incredible Edible' garden in Dunstable making a real difference to an area of unsightly waste land and leading to the community coming together with a common purpose.

The Incredible Edible project began in 2008 through the imagination and passion of a small group of friends in the Yorkshire town of Todmorden.

They saw unloved places and wondered if they planted veg in them and encouraged people to take what they needed they could create a conversation that would enable people to think differently about the power and potential of their future.

Incredible Edible seeks to show how ordinary people can transform their own landscapes and turned disused plots into abundant sources of healthy food. People took notice of the simple model, and today over 100 groups in the UK and many more around the world call themselves Incredible Edible.

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Headteacher's suc

Gary Lewis grew up in Hemel Hempstead and attended JFK School so knows the local area well. After flirting with possible careers in plumbing and professional football, his father encouraged him towards teaching.

Gary's main interest was science, and he studied Physics at Nottingham University, followed by a postgraduate teaching certificate at Manchester University. Initially working in the independent sector, he spent three years at St Columba's College in St Albans, followed by a short spell at a school in Uxbridge. He was then lured by his former headteacher at JFK to return there as Head of Science and about that time he met his Frenchborn wife and they set up home locally.

His career took a decisive turn when appointed deputy head of a Roman Catholic school in Hounslow, where he was 'groomed' to be headteacher. However, he was thwarted by the local authority requiring headteachers to hold the professional diploma, the NPQH, which Gary only acquired later. He therefore searched for other headships, and his wife spotted the Kings Langley vacancy and persuaded him to apply. He arrived for interview in a rather sullen mood, but by the time he got to the entrance he thought 'I want this school!' He made it clear in interview that he didn't have an instant solution for the school's problems but would, if appointed, radically change it long term. Within half an hour, the governors decided this was the person they wanted.

Since 2002, he has carried out his promise. The school is oversubscribed, well regarded in the community, and popular with parents and teachers. OFSTED notes that the students are proud of their school, but Gary is disappointed that the 'Outstanding' accolade has not yet been awarded. Despite good academic results he is

Whilst his main concern is for the wellbeing of students, he recognises that teaching is a tough, demanding profession and is concerned that many promising young teachers leave their posts because of the stresses involved; at Kings Langley School, teachers who are struggling with work/life balance can refer to an internal counselling service.

Last year Gary was appointed Executive Headteacher at Cavendish school in addition to his Kings Langley headship; the troubled Cavendish is now 'on the up', and Kings Langley continues to exhibit a happy, relaxed and wellregulated school atmosphere evident to visitors and OFSTED inspectors!

The society is a 'Collecting Society' under the umbrella of the Dacorum Heritage Trust (DHT) which exists as a Museum Store in Berkhamsted. The Kings Langley collection consists of 13,000 documents and artefacts – mainly stored at the DHT store but some in the Society Bookcase in the Library. The Ovaltine archive from the factory in Station Road (which ceased production in 2002), is also looked after by DHT at the Museum Store.

Kings Langley – pioneers in Royal Plumbing

History buffs in the village will know that Edmund of Langley was the fifth son of King Edward III. Edmund was born in the royal palace at the top of Langley Hill on 5 June 1341. His mother, Queen Philippa of Hainault, was churched in All Saints parish church a few days later. Langley Palace continued to be Edward's favourite country residence until he began building Eltham Palace on the other side of London.

When Edmund was young, Edward began a major refurbishment of Langley Palace on which he spent £3,000 – a very large sum at that time. It included the rebuilding of the bath house, bathing being one of the King's priorities (his Palace of Westminster bathroom featured bronze taps in the form of leopards).

In 1351, he made a plumbing breakthrough by introducing what was probably the first English bathroom with running hot and cold water, with one tap for hot and another for cold. Royal accounts record payments for 'a large square lead cistern for heating water at Langley Palace.' After giving orders for the furnace to be lit, the king could control the flow of water into the bath as he desired. Sadly, no trace remains of this splendid royal suite.

Edward III gained his reputation as 'the perfect king' by his heroic deeds on the battlefields of France but he was evidently also a connoisseur. He founded the Order of the Garter but it was a later monarch, George I, who created the Order of the Bath - a missed opportunity for Edward III!



STEINER SCHOOL what next?

After a lengthy period of discussion and negotiation with the Alpha Schools group, the Trustees of the Steiner school have confirmed that there will be no school opening on the site in September.

It appears that Alpha could not provide the necessary assurance to provide a Steiner education at RSSKL. This was a deal-breaker as it is one of the charitable objectives of the organisation and a constitutional obligation. It was evidently a very difficult decision to terminate negotiations having put so much time and effort into them and having come very close to reaching a deal.

The trustees are now focusing efforts and energy on seeking a suitable new partner with a view to opening a secure and sustainable Steiner school on site in the future. Meanwhile alternative RSSKL and community projects are being considered for the site.

A welcome donation!

A donation of £500 has been made to support the Kings Langley Good Neighbours Lunch Club. This has come from profits from an online not-for-profit store run by Neighbourhood Watch volunteers in Hertfordshire, with MacMillan Cancer Support, Help for Heroes, and Neighbourhood Watch in Hertfordshire also benefitting.

Alan Johnson, Treasurer of the Lunch Club, says 'The club falls under the Kings Langley Good Neighbours Association 'umbrella' but has a separate organisational structure, banking arrangements etc. It meets every Tuesday in the Baptist Church Hall for a lunch of main course and dessert followed by tea or coffee. There are about 25 members, most of whom live alone – and more members are welcome! There is a rota of volunteer helpers and drivers as nearly all the members have mobility issues meaning they need transport over even short distances. Members pay £6 each week to cover all costs with no extra charge for transport. Last year the Lunch Club were given a Community Award by the Parish Council for their service to the local community.

The volunteers try to provide something special on birthdays, at Easter and Christmas, with the help of donations; The net result is the Lunch Club is run on a shoestring and any additional funds ensure this vital service can continue to be provided to those for whom it provides a much needed lifeline.'
