



If there is one thing that connects all this year's entrants in the village Gardens Competition – which includes the allotment holders at Red Lion Lane and Sunderlands Yard – it is how infectiously happy and content they all seemed.

Even those at Sunderlands Yard, who have suffered two years of flooding ruining their root crops – and much else besides!

The RHS may have provided the answer – their research showed those who garden every day have wellbeing scores 6.6% higher and stress levels 5.2% lower than people who don't garden at all. It revealed a significant link between gardening more frequently and improvements in contentment, perceived stress and physical activity.

This year Parish Council judges Gerry Angiolini and Alan Johnson were joined by Ian and Alli Barrow from Sunnyside Trust, all ably supported by Ann Johnson. There were some new faces amongst the competitors too, with many being first-time entrants.

'It was great to see some of our regular participants,' said Gerry, 'and a real tonic to see what other gardeners have been up to in their back gardens!' He added 'After a very

wet six months, one might have been forgiven for thinking it was going to be a wash out. On the contrary, the standard was astronomically high – making the judging all the more difficult this year.'

At both the allotments, there was a level of activity on most of the plots as everyone was making the most of the temperate weather conditions. 'The rivalry is always well-mannered between the 80 allotment holders (and their families), resulting in a good deal of banter with the judges, and the variety of crops and plants on display a veritable rainbow explosion,' added Alan, 'but there always seems to be time for a picnic and a thermos of tea – or something stronger.'

The presentation evening for the winners will take place on Friday 18 October at Kings Langley Cricket Club, when the Best Overall Garden will be announced.

Clean heating for the village?

Grand Union Community
Energy (GUCE) is a local
non profit organisation
with multiple links to Kings
Langley. They are continuing
to investigate protecting
residents from volatile heating
bills, whilst eliminating
fossil fuels to achieve the
government's net zero targets.

In 2023 GUCE completed a Rural Community Energy Fund (RCEF) study into heating some homes in the village from the Grand Union Canal. What was discovered was way more exciting! Boreholes used at the Ovaltine factory during its heyday could produce quantities of water at a sufficient temperature to create a district heating network which could provide most of the village with clean energy at stable prices.

GUCE recently launched the next stage of this project and needs your help. They need to know what's most important to you when it comes to heating your home. There's a five minute online survey to collect your views here: bit.ly/klvn-quce

Sign up to Herts Connected for policing updates

The new Hertfordshire Constabulary community engagement messaging system, Herts Connected, is up and running and calling for new members to sign up to be kept informed of local policing issues.

Currently 260 Kings Langley residents have registered for free at *www. hertsconnected.co.uk* but countywide over 43,000 residents have signed up to receive alerts.

Your local Neighbourhood Police Team (NPT) uses the platform to communicate with the public. By sharing messages and information with residents, officers work to reduce crime and increase confidence.

In turn, residents can help by providing the police with feedback, and can directly influence local priorities and patrol plans within the village.

Residents will be able to opt into which information providers they would like to hear from and select their interests to ensure message relevancy.

Dacorum Heritage to tell the story of Kings Langley's Ovaltine Factory

Heritage charity Dacorum Heritage is looking to collect and record the memories of former employees of the Ovaltine Factory in Kings Langley.

Since 2002, Dacorum Heritage has cared for over 10,000 objects, ranging from advertising artwork and films to uniforms and office documents, that were rescued from the factory by the Kings Langley Local History and Museum Society upon its closure.

Dacorum Heritage is now looking to bring this archive to life by capturing the stories of people who worked for Ovaltine, which opened its factory in Kings Langley in 1913.

Gathering the oral histories of former workers will contribute to the heritage trust's wider project, made possible through funding from The Garfield Weston Foundation and the Arts Council England, to digitise and

increase engagement with Dacorum Heritage's Ovaltine Collection.

Dacorum Heritage also has a number of activities planned to share the collection with the community including pop-up reminiscence events, a short film made with input from young people, and a publication of collection highlights.

Fiona Page, chairman of Dacorum Heritage, said 'Being a museum store, open by appointment only, we don't have the facilities for a large-scale public exhibition. This means we have to think creatively about how we reach and inspire the public with the local heritage collections we care for.

'We have a fascinating and rich archive from Ovaltine, but we can't show what it was truly like to work for the factory without the real voices and real stories of the workers. We are





acting now to make sure that those stories are preserved before they are lost for good.'



Di swims the Solent for MND

Local physiotherapist Di Hewetson swam from Ryde in the Isle of Wight across the busy Solent estuary to Gosport on Monday 15 July, to raise money for the Ian Pratt Motor Neurone Disease foundation.

Di's father, Bill Goodchild, was diagnosed with motor neurone disease in October 2017 and passed away in February 2018. Bill had been in the Royal Navy and sailed on warships in and out of Portsmouth Harbour hundreds of times, so it seemed fitting to swim across from Isle of Wight to the mainland.

It was an early start and, after taking the 6.15am ferry from Portsmouth to Ryde, at 8am they swam back to the mainland. Accompanied by kayakers, Di swam with a group of seven swimmers across the shipping lanes through quite a swell and a choppy sea. Just over 6km and 2 hours 31 minutes later, she arrived, in the pouring rain, just so pleased to get there.

Olympic endeavours at Waterside!

Inspired by the Olympic Games in Paris recently, the Waterside Centre in Kings Langley has been holding their own Olympic events over the past few weeks.

Events were started off by an Olympic Torch relay throughout the village with small teams of staff and attendees being stationed around the village and passing on a Waterside version of the torch.

Different games, including water pistol shooting, bean bag shot putt, archery, cup stacking and many more have been held every day with teams competing against each other for Gold, Silver and Bronze. It is planned to continue the competition throughout the Paralympics too!

All of the activities involve a great deal of fun and help keep people active with some of them also incorporating literacy or numeracy as part of the game. They are all adapted to take account of the range of abilities of the people taking part.

The Waterside Centre is a small





day centre for adults with learning disabilities; some also have associated conditions such as epilepsy, autism. communication difficulties, mobility problems, sensory difficulties or mental health issues.

It is a small charity and, if you were to pop in, you would see about 25-30 people actively engaged in a range of meaningful activities such as literacy and numeracy, cooking, food tasting, art and crafts and sewing. They also go out for badminton, swimming, the gym and for local walks throughout the week.

They are currently raising funds to help to run a minibus (due to arrive in a couple of months) so that they can go further afield and include more people who cannot travel in ordinary cars - donations towards this would be very welcome.

Open season on the green belt

'They say bad news comes in threes,' mused Kings Langley and District Residents Association Chair Gary Ansell, 'but at the moment it feels like we are heading for double figures!

A recent Government announcement of increased housing targets seems to have assessed where housing is needed – and then ignored it.'

The latest housing figures suggest that targets have been reduced in London and other major cities where the housing shortage is most acute and the infrastructure is already in place. In the north, where housing is already abundant, the housing targets have been significantly raised; and targets are also raised in rural areas where demand is generally lower, infrastructure scarcer and affordability all but non-existent.

'For anyone who thinks that there is no more Green Belt in Kings Langley available for development, think again,' added Gary. 'A number of green spaces in and around the village are owned by developers, and other sites which have previously been put forward for development, may see further plans submitted or re-submitted.'

KL&DRA remains frustrated that across England there are over a million homes allocated in local plans which are waiting to be taken up by developers, and more than a million homes in England that have got planning permission in the last 12 years (to 2023) that still haven't been built. That's half a million more than the current five-year target for more housing development – with open season having been declared on the Green Belt.



The Apsley Two – and in developing news...

Following the various Green Belt developments in and around the village, comes news of a brownfield development on the site of the old Herts County Council building on London Road, Apsley.

Approval has been given for redevelopment to provide a four-storey building for office floorspace, a five-storey building providing 65 retirement living apartments (McCarthy and Stone) and a five-storey building of 69 one-bedroom apartments. There will be 146 car parking spaces.

'As the Kings Langley Neighbourhood Plan acknowledges,' said Councillor Alan Johnson, 'there is a shortage of one and two-bedroom properties which this development will go some way towards meeting. Indeed, there was an argument that this was a better 'option' than Rectory Farm which mostly provides larger, family properties – but now we have both.'

There are inevitably concerns about infrastructure and traffic, including demands upon schools, GP and dental services, water and sewerage, public transport and roads. Work is expected to start on this development in 2025; work on Rectory Farm will start later this year.

Beverley cares about the village, its people and its heritage, and those she worked with. She cares about the people who come to the Council offices and those who hire the hall, and does everything she can to help make their 'experience' a positive one.

She would frequently go above and beyond what might be expected, and then it would become what was expected, because it is in her nature to give 110%. Beverley will be remembered for her contribution to village events, including the Christmas Lights, the Best Kept Gardens' competition, but also, importantly, her work with the late former Chairman

Ron Smith, in organising the World War One centenary commemorations.

It was a huge success, with Beverley carrying out a tremendous amount of research, mostly in her own time, and produced a magnificent 'guide' for the event. The arrangements for the Queen's Jubilee celebrations were equally well received.

Her concern for the heritage of the village extended to the replacement of the Village Pound in Common Lane (which was in a state of terminal decay), with a reconstruction in English Oak. She persevered with the project despite a general degree of apathy, obtaining a grant from Tesco. It is a wonderful monument to our past, with a full explanation on an adjacent information board.

A number of councillors past and present also have reason to be thankful for her kindness and consideration through life's tribulations. Thank you, Beverley.




