Village comes together to reject housing plans

The village has united in its rejection of a proposed planning application, with an almost unanimous vote to oppose the building of 150 homes on Hill Farm land.

When the consultation period ended in mid-February, 237 public comments had been left on the council's portal, only one of which was in favour of the application.

The volume of lengthy, passionate objections showed a strength of feeling among the community who variously cited loss of Green Belt land, traffic congestion, a lack of amenities and increased pressure on local infrastructure as the key reasons why the location represents a poor choice for development.

One resident also highlighted the disruption to students at Kings Langley School, which directly adjoins the site, saying 'This work is slated to take three years. That's three years of diggers, drills, machinery, excavation and lorries every single day, just metres from a secondary school. I can't begin to imagine how seriously that will impact concentration, sports sessions and exam periods, not to mention the horrendous pollution that's going to be pumped into the school grounds. Either this hasn't been considered,

which is shortsighted, or has been dismissed, which is deeply selfish.'

reen Belt land under threat

Campaigners, including Green Belt Matters, have been working tirelessly to oppose an outline planning application on the land, which would be accessed via a new entry point at 36 Chipperfield Road, with one – who didn't wish to be named – calling the process exhausting, frustrating and damaging to their mental health.

She said 'Fighting this initial application has consumed us for months and even with virtually unanimous objections from the public there's no guarantee that will make any difference to the decision. We all feel helpless and know that this is only the tip of the iceberg. Even if this application gets refused they'll submit another one.

'The length and detail of the objections on the council website must surely show how passionately our community feels about stopping this development. But at what stage do the feelings of those of us who live in and love this village get taken into consideration? It seems

decisions are made in offices miles away, ticking quota boxes, without any thought for the serious long term consequences.'

The group say the distance from the centre of the village, plus the funnelling of traffic down Vicarage Lane, Langley Hill and Common Lane, will make the area dangerously congested.

Councillor Richard Roberts, who has been fighting the application on behalf of residents, said 'This is an outrageous speculative application on a site which was rejected after consultation not once but three times. If anything the site has had its Green Belt credentials strengthened. Planning officers are so worried about development behind Chipperfield Road and extending all the way to Barnes Lane that they rejected its inclusion under both the local Conservatives and Lib Dem Councils.

'We may not be able to save all the Green Belt but we can't abandon the principle altogether or Kings Langley village will be lost and simply become a suburb of Hemel Hempstead.'

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Bob Davies 12.11.49 - 1.12.24

As the eldest of three children, Bob's early years were spent in and around Kings Langley. He followed in his father';s footsteps and attended Watford Boys Grammar School where he made lifelong friends.

Bob's love of life, humour and his slightly naughty streak meant he was very politely asked to leave at the age of 17.

Central to the community from an early age, Bob joined 1st Kings Langley

Scout Group, becoming a patrol leader, and was a member of All Saints Church Youth Club, taking over the pews in the bell tower on Sundays.

As a teenager, his interest in all things mechanical developed, acquiring his dad's love of motorbikes and cars, endlessly taking them apart and putting them back together again with ever increasing skill.

In 1970 Bob took his first steps into his lifelong career at Taylors Tools, and was passionate about the business he built there – he lived to sell and to make customers happy. When his sons James and Ed joined the business, he taught them to look after everyone.

He married Hilary at All Saints on 7 September 1974 and they recently celebrated 50 years of marriage.

Bob's love of children (and their love of him) meant he became somewhat of a bonus dad to the kid's friends or friend's kids. He would take many under his wing, becoming a father figure and a role model. His generosity of spirit, giving time and attention to everyone and, importantly, giving everyone a chance, meant there is a fabulous array of shop employees who never wanted to leave, or whose lives have had a heavy imprint of Taylors Tools (or Bob) on them.

Bob and Hilary loved to travel, visiting 92 countries despite bringing up four kids, building and renovating three houses and working a six-day week!

He was a well loved and respected Mason, known for his excellent recitals, and became a mentor to many. It is said that a mark of a man's success is the amount of love he generates in his life. That being so, Bob was hugely successful. To his family he was the world's most amazing husband, dad, grandad and more. A hugely respected figure in the community, whose popularity was evident by the numbers who packed All Saints church for his funeral on 18 December.

Pamela Wells 5.8.28 - 24.1.25

A Service of Celebration for the life of Pam, who had lived in the village for the past 73 years, was held in All Saints Church on 18 February. Latterly, she was a familiar sight in the High Street trundling along on her mobility scooter.

Born into a farming family near Chichester, Pam's early education was with a neighbouring Governess. When the family moved to Cambridge, she attended Cambridge High School for Girls. Pam's mother had a large vegetable garden to supplement their meagre war rations. Her father, Jack, taught her to skin the wild rabbits he shot, as the rabbits would eat the growing vegetables.

After the war her parents moved to Alderney in the Channel Islands, where her father reallocated the farmland as people returned after the German occupation. Pam recalled returning to school in Cambridge in a flying boat out of Alderney harbour. After school she trained in pharmacy, working at a chemist in Worthing. Here, at a Young Farmers Ball, she met John Wells and they were married at Kington, near Lewes, in 1950.



Pam and John worked as estate managers for a disabled childrens' home in Kent, before later moving to a similar post at Michael Hall in Forest Row, where John was an old scholar. She cultivated an interest in Bio dynamic gardening along with Rudolf Steiner's philosophy on education. In 1954 Pam and John moved to Kings Langley Rudolf Steiner school for John to teach Class one and Gymnastics.

As her two sons, Nigel and Simon, grew older, Pam took a teacher training course at Wall Hall. She then taught at The Divine Saviour school in Abbots Langley, later taking a Dyslexia training course after which she taught individual children at home or around various Hertfordshire schools.

Along with Tom Burke and others, Pam set up the Kings Langley History Society which published various articles and a book on local history. With Beryl Pizzy, she also took on The Luncheon club for the over 60s, organizing a network of car drivers to ferry the diners of Kings Langley to a weekly social lunch, cooked initially by the Ovaltine factory canteen. This later joined Kings Langley Good Neighbours Association, whose services Pam later greatly appreciated herself.

For many years Pam enjoyed a Tuesday group of friends who studied lectures of Rudolf Steiner. Pam said she could not live without classical music and the natural world in her garden, in which she liked to walk daily. She especially loved watching the sky and clouds.

Hertfordshire Constabulary launches new drone team

Hertfordshire Constabulary has expanded its drone capabilities in the county, adding a new specially trained drone team to their Operational Support Group (OSG).

The OSG is a specialist police unit that tackles volume priority and organised criminality, such as robbery, burglary, drugs and assaults. They are trained in police tactics such as executing warrants, public order and taser deployment. They work across the county, assisting local officers with operations and investigations.

The ten new specially trained drone pilots will be working in collaboration with five existing drone pilots, using drones in a number of ways including to support high-risk missing person searches, warrant executions, scene investigations, search and rescue operations, as well as being utilised during major incidents.

Inspector Paul Stanbridge, who heads up the OSG, said 'Drone technology has improved so much in recent years, it's only right that we have increased capacity in using this crucial equipment across Herts police. Whether we're looking for a missing person or pursuing an offender, drones are a vital tool in modern policing.'







Parking charges go live in March

Visitors who drive to the High Street will be charged to park from Monday 31 March.

The charges will be payable 8am – 6pm, seven days a week (free overnight). The parking bays between Langley Hill and Vicarage Lane will cost 80p for 30 mins or £1.50 for an hour, with no return within two hours.

Payments need to be made by card either at a machine or via an app. South of Langley Hill and north of Vicarage Lane, the bays are free for 30 minutes, but with no return within two hours.

The car spaces in The Nap and Langley Hill are free to park for up to four hours between 8am and 6pm – no return within two hours. There is no time limit in the car parks outside these times.

Male voices sought to join choir



Parish Council welcomes Police Commissioner

This year's Kings Langley Annual Parish Meeting will take place at 7.30pm on Thursday 24 April at Kings Langley School's Sixth Form Centre.

Amongst those speaking, and answering questions, at the public meeting is Jonathan Ash-Edwards (right), Hertfordshire's Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC).

'The role of the PCC is to be the voice of the residents and hold the local police to account; they are responsible for the totality of policing,' explained Councillor Alan Johnson. 'PCCs aim to cut crime and deliver an efficient police service. It's a big job!'

The meeting is also an opportunity for the Parish Council, and other local organisations, to let local residents know what they have been doing over the past year.

As readers of Village News will know,



there has been a lot happening this year, from the continuing saga of parking charges being introduced in the High Street and proposals for a roundabout at the Vicarage Lane and High Street junction, to permission granted for an additional 135 properties on Rectory Farm and proposals for an additional 650 dwellings at Shendish and Hill Farm.

Other speakers are expected to include County Councillor Richard Roberts on the increasing challenges – not just financial – of issues such as social care and highways infrastructure, and Frances Stickley, Chair of Governors at Kings Langley School, talking about the exciting times ahead following the opening of the Sixth Force Centre and the 3G sports pitches.

A survey of young people conducted by Kings Langley Parish Council has identified the current demand for communal social facilities for teens in the village.

The Neighbourhood Plan has previously identified little provision for teenagers, other than those created by organisations such as the Scouts, with very little outdoor provision available for this age group.

Through externally-run focus groups it was possible to provide an assessment of what is currently available and consider how this aligns with what this older age group would like in terms of leisure facilities, to establish unaddressed demand.

Many respondents expressed a preference for unstructured, self-directed leisure activities, but it was generally felt that there is a lack of such opportunities. Whilst sports facilities and the range of activities provided by the senior school were praised, it was considered there was room for further improvement.

Some participants favoured development of current park/ outdoor facilities, for example the addition of basketball and tennis courts, bike tracks or dirt/off road trails, and outdoor gym facilities. Others welcomed the concept of a youth group, where they could meet in a more informal setting with friends. Such a facility would include activities like a pool table, darts, and table tennis, possibly with the addition of refreshments or a café.

The parish council will be considering the full report over the next few months with a view to potentially providing some funding or signposting for some of these ideas.

Ping! 'That sounds like a text message. Oh, it's Good Neighbours with two requests for a driver...

'(Thinks) No, I haven't time to drive to Mount Vernon and wait a while, but I could certainly fit in that other one to the local surgery and be back in time for the school run. So, yes, I'll accept that one.

'Five minutes later I receive a
"Thank you" text from the duty
officer with details of the client's
name and address, time of her
appointment and telephone
number. I'll call her now as she'll be
wondering... "All fixed up", she says,
"I'll be looking out of the window on the
day and time we've arranged!"'

These days that is how the Good Neighbours' Association helpline works. When a call comes in on 07790 668672, the operator sends text messages to five or six drivers with suitable cars and dates they've offered as available.

Sooner or later one of them will text or phone and the arrangement is quickly made. All this depends, of course, on having enough car drivers to share the load. During last summer there were a few weeks when many of the regular drivers gave overlapping holiday dates, and occasionally they were unable to fulfil a request. In addition there are some very

willing drivers who are prepared to take an extra turn, for which Good Neighbours is very grateful.

These talks are always well attended so call in to buy your tickets soon – tickets for both talks are available from the library for £5 each to include refreshments.




Free local walks information

Has the recent spring-like weather persuaded you to get up and get out for a walk in the countryside?

We are lucky that Hertfordshire is such a beautiful rural county with hundreds of walks to enjoy. One couple – Ellie and Dave Brewer from Brookmans Park – wanted to share their love of walking in the Hertfordshire countryside with like-minded people, so they created a website and have documented over 290 Hertfordshire walks in detail over the last 25 years.

Their walks are colour-coded by distance and elevation, many are loops and you can even search for walks around a specific pub or cafe. The walks can be downloaded to your phone and used with a free GPS satellite navigation app. There are no costs involved and you can find all of their walks at www.hertfordshirewalker.uk

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Give your views on proposed cyclist access

Or, as it is more properly called, the Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP – phonetically Elsie Whip).

This plan covers Dacorum Borough and is intended to promote the central government's ambition to make walking and cycling the natural choice for shorter journeys or parts of longer journeys. The parish council encouraged local residents to respond to earlier parts of the consultation process with a view to getting traffic lights at the Vicarage Lane/High Street junction.

The final recommendations are now out for consultation at Dacorum LCWIP until 23 March 2025. The recommendations include improvements at the Rucklers Lane junction with Hempstead Road in the form of early release signals and advanced stop lines for cyclists. In addition, the Hempstead Road would become a shared-use path for pedestrians and cyclists; some verges would be removed to increase the footway width to a minimum of three metres.

Parish Councillor Alan Johnson said 'Needless to say, none of these proposals were on our wish list, and frankly this could cause mayhem if implemented, with the need to potentially widen some footpaths on Hempstead Road by over a metre. It may even involve moving some street furniture and verges on both sides of the current footpath. We would urge residents to respond with their views.'

A series of fundraising events have seen Kings Langley Cricket Club smash its goal of raising £25,000 to renovate its patio and outside seating area.

Members of the club were the driving force behind the fundraiser, with many donating 'incentives' such as a tour of a racing stable, Sri Lankan food and a trip in a classic car. The club also ran a Golf Day, a guiz and had a special section of their End of Season Dinner that was designed to get hands in pockets.

Through Crowdfunder, a charityoriented website that helps to match external funding to projects, the club applied for a grant of £12,500 from Sport England – who distribute lottery funds to sports clubs – but this was subject to them matching the amount with further donations.

Additional funding was acquired via Community Action Dacorum, with the specific purpose of improving the disabled access to the club. The total raised finally hit £30,000, all of which will go towards the renovations.

The facilities at KLCC, which will celebrate its 200th anniversary in 2030, were last upgraded in the mid-1980s but the terrace in particular is now in urgent need of modernisation.

Work will get underway in the next month or so and the club hopes to have an 'official' opening on Saturday 10 May.

Tom Templeton, club chairman, said, 'We needed the generosity of local businesses, grants from charitable bodies, the Members to step up and for the local community to get involved. Everyone has!'

Selfish act damages common

A vandal has caused damage to the Common after driving their car in circles around the cricket square.

On the afternoon of 12 February the driver of a Subaru mounted the kerb, drove around the cricket pitch and drove off, leaving extensive tyre tracks in the grass – which was already in a poor state thanks to months of bad weather.

Tom Templeton, KLCC chairman, said 'They might have had 45 seconds of "fun" but the damage done will take 20+ volunteer hours and a significant cost in grass seed and diesel to put right.

'This was reported to the police and local people have provided pictures and video. Sadly the Police have decided to close the inquiry. We hope that the repairs will be complete for the start of the cricket season in late April.'


