Our village remembers

Kings Langley residents have long been proud to remember the sacrifices of men and women from our village, and the Memorial in the Village Garden at All Saints' Church has been the focus of Remembrance Day services for a hundred years.



Historic England notes 'Kings Langley War Memorial, erected in 1920, is listed at Grade II for the following principal reasons:

- Historic interest: as a war memorial that has strong cultural and historic significance within both a local and national context;
- *Commemorative:* as a poignant reminder of the tragic impact of

world events on the local community, and the sacrifice it made during the First and Second World Wars:

- *Design:* as an elegant Latin cross set upon a tapering shaft, octagonal plinth and stepped base;
- Group value: with the Grade II* listed All Saints' Church and Grade II listed monuments in the churchyard.'

The Memorial was funded by local subscription and erected in 1920 to commemorate 38 residents of Kings

Langley who died during the World War 1. It was unveiled on 10 October 1920 by Sir Thomas Frederick Halsey (1839–1927), a Conservative politician and army officer, who had served as MP for Hertfordshire.

The events this year will allow today's villagers the chance to remember the sacrifices made by those who fought and those who didn't return home, especially from WW1.



Village Garden memorial tree

The village has planted a memorial tree in the Village Garden marking the 100 year anniversary since the end of the First World War.

Following the wreath laying ceremony at the war memorial on Sunday 11 November, the memorial tree and plaque will be formally unveiled by Sarah Fisher, a descendant of Dr Reginald Fisher who made the Village Garden land available for public use.

The plaque will commemorate all those villagers, men and women, who served their country in the First World War.

'The tree is a liquid amber variety,' explained Parish Councillor Alan Johnson. 'We chose it because it has warm autumn colours of orange, yellow and purple and, importantly, it is amongst the last of the deciduous trees to relinquish its autumn foliage.'



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One year on...

The Kings Langley Village News

Refreshments will be served in the church hall, and the Local History & Museum Society will display records, photos and artefacts of WWI in the small hall and in the church from 11.30am -4pm.

12.30 pm Bell Ringing – Remembering the 1400 ringers who died in WW1

7.00pm Bell Ringing – Battle's Over: ringing out for peace



The project There But Not There, run by the charity Remembered, aims to place a representative figure for names on local war memorials around the country, with transparent seated silhouettes being a visible commemoration for the end of the First World War.

Kings Langley Parish Council has obtained ten of the transparent silhouettes through a grant and these have been placed in All Saints' Church for the period of Remembrance. The project aims are to Commemorate, Educate and Heal.

Commemorate those who died in the First World War through installations of silhouettes wherever there is a Roll of Honour

Educate all generations, particularly today's younger generation, born nearly 100 years after the outbreak of WW1, to understand what led to the deaths of 888,246 British and Commonwealth service personnel.

Heal today's veterans who are suffering from the mental and physical wounds of their service by raising substantial funds through sales of our silhouettes.

PLANNING UPDATES from Councillors Alan Anderson and Bob McClean, Kings Langley, Dacorum Borough Council



Bad news – motorway service area proposal

Some readers may have seen reports in the Watford Observer about Three Rivers District Council planning officers working to obtain a new motorway service area in the corner of land to the South of the M25 J20 roundabout, with access via a new roundabout on the A41.

We are opposed to it, as it would significantly reduce the Green Belt separating Watford and Hemel Hempstead, plus it would make the existing traffic congestion problems at this location far worse, and it would have a very harmful effect on the economic health of the High Street.

Sir Mike Penning MP has already pledged support for our campaign, and this could be crucial, as given the importance of the project, it could ultimately be determined by the Government.

Three Rivers Local Plan

Three Rivers District Council has published a consultation document on potential future development sites, which includes locations bordering Kings Langley east of the canal.

Good news – the railway station is NOT closing

The County Council's Environmental Sustainability officers drew up a document full of 'outside the box' ideas on how to upgrade the local transport network for future demands.

Some of the ideas were daft, like the closure of Kings Langley and Apsley railway stations, and they were dropped from both the summary consultation document and the consultation, which ran from July to September.

However, that hasn't stopped one of the candidates in the County Council by-election from claiming that the councillors controlling the County Council are aiming to close these railway stations. This is completely untrue and reflects very badly on the political party making the claim!

Some ideas that did make it into the

consultation, meanwhile, were just as daft. Much of the controversy centred on restricting Fishery Road in Hemel Hempstead to public transport only, but there were plenty of other silly ideas, including, closer to home, barring right turns towards Kings Langley at the bottom of Two Waters Way, and bus lanes on the A41.

The consultation survey was completed to point out how ridiculous the ideas were, and fortunately both the County Council's highway officers and controlling councillors have since expressed grave concerns about the ideas, nearly all of which will inevitably be dropped.

Strategic Planning and green belt

Dacorum Borough Council is required by legislation to produce a document called a Local Plan, which will guide the development of the whole Borough up to 2036.

The process of this is lengthy and has already caused controversy in Kings Langley – the initial Issues and Options consultation in Autumn 2017 considered a large amount of Green Belt development around the village at Rectory Farm (125 houses), Hill Farm (250 houses), Shendish (900 houses and primary school) & Wayside Farm (100-2000 houses).

The Council had intended to conduct a second round of consultation this

Autumn, including the Government's housebuilding target set at the end of July, and our preferred housebuilding target, but the Government has now said it will not finally set our target until next Summer.

The housebuilding target is crucial, as it will determine the pressure on the Green Belt. If we're able to keep it at the capped level of 600 houses per year, then we'll be able to restrict the loss of Green Belt to the absolute minimum, which sadly includes the Rectory Farm site.

But if the Government sticks to the figure it set in Spring 2018 (1,100 houses per year), then we'd potentially be looking at the horrendous loss of all four sites around the village.

With the Government continually moving the goalposts, there was no way we could go through with the consultation this Autumn, and we are now forced to wait until next Summer before we can progress the Local Plan with the next consultation.

Cricket club update An Improving Start to the Season for Kings Langley FC

After a run of harsh results against the team's actual performances at the start of the season (one point after four games), Kings Langley FC (KINGS) results finally turned a corner with a great late August Bank Holiday victory over our illustrious neighbours Chesham United.

The match was won with a goal scored by the new – and probably highest profile – signing Rene Howe (eight years a professional footballer). The recent arrival of Rene and young goalkeeper Charlie Burns has helped the KINGS move out of the relegation zone with the win against Chesham and away at Swindon Supermarine (4-3), plus a very credible draw (2–2) against Tiverton. The only recent league defeat being 1-0 away at Frome.

The KINGS played four FA Cup matches in September drawing 0-0 away at Northwood (taking over 100 away supporters), then winning the replay 3–1 including a fantastic headed goal by striker Mitchell Weiss. This was followed by a 1-1 draw at home to Lewes, although the KINGS had many chances to win that match, which made it even more heartbreaking to lose the replay 2–1 on the following Tuesday night replay in Sussex (again with excellent travelling support from the village).

On 24 November some of the club's supporters will be undertaking a sponsored 16 mile walk from the club to Beaconsfield Town FC in support of the SANDS (Stillborn & Neonatal Death Society) charity - any financial or verbal support on the route will be gratefully received.

The KINGS start another march to Wembley at home to Needham Market in the FA Trophy on Saturday 27 October, after which there are four home league games in November: Poole (3/11), Met Police (13/11), 'top of the table' Weymouth (17/11) and Hendon (27/11).

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The Life and Times of Joy Town

Shortly after the war in 1947 I came to Kings Langley with my husband Bill, who was working in Apsley, and our first son Tony. We met during the war when both in the RAF – I was a meteorologist on night duty and Bill had just come back from North Africa and was guarding a crashed plane at RAF Wittering – and we married in 1945.

We took two rooms in the cottages by the *Old Palace* public house – it was very cramped as we shared an outside tap and toilet with the whole row of cottages – not easy with a baby! In 1950 we were offered a council house in Coniston Road – it was like going to a palace from our two cramped rooms, and we settled in very quickly. Despite being a new house there was no fridge or washing machine; we had to heat water in a copper to do the washing and dry it in front of the fire.

Bill was an avid cricketer and was invited to join the cricket club where we made many friends. Peggy and Doug Laidler took us to away matches all over the county in their car – sometimes we had to get out when we came to hill and walk as the car engine wasn't strong enough to take us all! I did my stint at scoring and making

cricket club teas, we had very little food in those days, so it was a scraping of margarine and whatever we could get to fill the sandwiches.

In 1952 I joined the WI, and before long I joined the committee – first as press officer, then treasurer. It was very formal in those days, most of the ladies wore hats, although us younger members didn't fuss about them.

In 1953 on Coronation Day the WI made individual goodie boxes for the children and went to the common for a picnic and games. We were lucky to have a 9" TV, so about ten or 12 people decamped to our house to watch the Coronation

After I had our second son John in 1956 we got a washing machine – still hard work compared to today's machines!



The village was much quieter then, but traffic did start to build up and there were no crossings on the High Street, so the mums decided to do something about it; one day we were walking back and forth across the road with our prams by the Saracen's Head to make the case for a crossing – we eventually got it! There were typical village shops:

three grocers, two butchers, three sweet shops, two bakeries, a hairdresser, and a petrol station by the old post office. The petrol was dispensed by an arm which came out into the road – if you were walking by you had to duck or walk around into the road... health and safety didn't exist!

Buses were regular and frequent to Tring, Aylesbury and Watford, you didn't need a timetable you just went to the bus stop and waited. Within a short while living in the village I knew nearly everybody – there were no commuters and the men came home for lunch as they worked locally at Dickinson's or Ovaltine.

When I left school in the 30's I had wanted to be a teacher but couldn't afford to go to college. In 1966 I again felt the urge to teach, so after discussion with my family I went to Wall Hall teacher training college in Aldenham for two years, and spent 13 wonderful years teaching in Maylands junior school in Adeyfield.

I see my wonderful family, sons Tony and John, three grandchildren and two great

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Carnival crescendo

For those who think the Kings Langley Carnival finished in bright sunshine on 23 June, think again. Over £5,400 was raised by the event and was recently donated to 27 local good causes and groups at a presentation evening at the Kings Langley Cricket Club.

It was an occasion to marvel at the extraordinary range of local groups within the village that provide a variety of activities and services to villagers of all ages. This year, cheque recipients included the Arts and Crafts Society, Kings Langley Football Club, Kings Langley Lunch Club, the Waterways Experience and the Musical Theatre Co.

The Arts and Crafts Society will use the grant from the Carnival towards more yarn bombing exploits in the High Street in November and December, and the opportunity to pursue other creative and artistic pursuits.

On a more energetic level, the Football Club, which currently has 20 youth teams, want to form a team for the over 45's to encourage keeping fit and socialising.

The Lunch Club meets every Tuesday and provides the elderly with a meal – typically meat and two vegetables and a dessert – followed by tea or coffee for the princely sum of £6. The Carnival donation will be used to

give additional treats at Christmas and birthdays.

The Waterways Experience have three spacious wide-beam boats to provide accessible boat trips for sailors of all ages; the grant will go towards providing holidays for teenagers with learning disabilities.

The Kings Langley Musical Theatre Company, celebrating its 70th year, will use the grant from the Carnival to hire a grand piano for one of their forthcoming shows.

Carol Chandler, chair of the Carnival Committee, said 'We were delighted to welcome Rosie Sutton, Mayor of Dacorum, at the Carnival during the summer and doubly delighted that she was able to attend the presentation evening. It's great that the Carnival can yet again support so many worthwhile and exciting local groups and activities with some additional funds.'


