Parish Councillor John Morrish is leading a small working party aiming to develop a plan that represents residents' views, with evidence gathered via a comprehensive questionnaire which will give you a voice in the debate and help them formulate the Parish Plan.

Says John: 'This Plan will be based on residents' views about the future of the village and how to protect the special features that make Kings Langley such a good place to live in. We can't promise that every view expressed will end up in the finished report, but if you don't express your views, they can't be included! So please, tell us what you think.'

Enclosed in your *Village News* is a copy of the Parish Plan questionnaire which every single resident of Kings



Langley is being asked to complete to give their view. There's also an opportunity in the questionnaire to volunteer for focus groups to further develop ideas on some of the key issues for the Parish.

In November 2017 over 800 local residents flocked to a public meeting at Kings Langley school after the Dacorum Borough Council's consultation document on future housing development was announced. The four proposed sites

were all greenbelt land, and with temperatures running high, voices were loudly against this threat to the parish's rural existence. A month later, a village poll clearly sent a message back to future development planners that 99% of Kings Langley residents were against any loss of greenbelt land.

A year has passed since residents said what they didn't want, but the debate continues over future developments in the village. Now it's time for residents to have your say on what you DO want.

John asks for your responses to be sent before the end of January. 'We need everyone to express their views. Ten minutes of your time will help shape the future of Kings Langley to 2036, so don't delay in having your say! We aim to have a final report ready by May 2019.'



If you missed the presentations by MOTO in October about the possible development of a motorway service area at M25 J20, there will be the opportunity to have your say when the development plans are submitted – we understand this is likely to be in early 2019.

Three Rivers District Council will have to accept any objections as part of the planning process – this can be done via the planning section of their website once a planning application has been submitted, or via post or email.

What do you think? Is a new motorway services really needed - there's already South Mimms only a few miles further along the M25? What's the congestion on the A41 going to be like at rush hour – it already backs up on all carriageways to and from the motorway junction? And how much longer would it take to get out of the village with the extra traffic using the motorway roundabout? Yes, it may provide new jobs in the area but at what environmental cost? Green-belt exploitation, more traffic congestion, more air pollution, more litter etc...

Kings Langley FC push into Mid-Table

A blip of three league games without a win led to Kings Langley dropping into the relegation zone for the first time since early September.

However, this predicament seemed to only push our lads on as they went on a fantastic run of one league defeat in six, with four wins on the trot in November, taking the club from 20th to 12th in only two weeks. Although performances have improved all around the pitch it is no accident that this change of results has been in parallel with the arrival of goalkeeper Alex Tokarczyk (from Chesham), ex-Watford professional Junior Osbourne (Hendon) and Luke Wade-Slater (on loan from Stevenage) with the latter scoring five goals in five consecutive games, two of which were crackers from well outside the box.

In other news, supporters completed a 15-mile sponsored walk in support of SANDS (Stillborn & Neonatal Death Society) from the football club to Harrow Borough FC for the match there on 29 December, and raised over £2600. The team then won the 7-goal thriller in the match that followed!

Volunteer Library Proves a Winner! In February 2018, Kings Langley Library became one of the first libraries in Hertfordshire to become entirely volunteer run.

Recently, the team of volunteers (above) has been recognised for its success, with Committee Chair, Caroline Brankin, awarded Hertfordshire County Council's *Volunteer of the Year Award 2018.* The library has had a facelift with a fresh coat of paint and new lighting!

Throughout 2018 the volunteers have come a long way, becoming proficient in running the library, dealing with membership enquiries, shelving and stock editing. But they want to offer more than just a standard library service, and they have been hard at work finding new ways to make the library a vibrant and interesting community facility.

The team have introduced regular book displays such as *Banned Books* and also artistic displays of images and poetry such as *Autumn*. These always create lively discussion with library visitors. Evacuated to Kings

'I first came to live in Kings Langley in September 1939, as an evacuee from the borough of Paddington in West London. I was four and a half years old and was accompanied by my sister, Adrienne, who was six.'

'We had both spent the previous few days sitting on the floor of the main hall in Essendine Junior School, neither of us fully understanding what was about to happen to us. Our arrival at this strange destination was the first time that we had been separated from our parents, which was a bit frightening to say the least. We were billeted together for a year with a family about half way along Primrose Hill, Mr and Mrs Wright and their daughter Joan. I recall the first few days with the Wrights - I spent several hours at the top of the back garden watching the trains go by, whilst my sister was indoors crying her eyes out as she was missing our mother.

After about a year, Adrienne and I were separated, and she went to live with the Neary family up a side road off Harthall Lane, where she stayed for about eighteen months before being moved to Bishops Stortford, evidently because educational opportunities were better in that area (it obviously worked as she ended up with a degree in Geography, whilst I ended up with nothing!) Meanwhile I was transferred to the home of Mr and Mrs Hiscock and their two sons Jack and Gordon, at 7 Primrose Hill, where I remained until the end of the war in July 1945.

When I returned home to London I was elated, in my opinion Kings Langley was the worst place in the world, and if I never saw it again I wouldn't lose any sleep! I had no complaints with the families that had looked after me, but I always felt that I was the odd one out, and missed not living with my own family, despite my parents visiting on many occasions.

Back in London, after finishing my schooling, I started working life as an apprentice electrical fitter in 1952 at the British Thompson Houston Co. After National Service spent in Hong Kong and Singapore, and marrying Margaret in 1961, we moved to Canon's Park and started our family. Returning from a party in Berkhamsted in the early hours one morning in 1968, we saw a





Kings Langley village is recorded in the Domesday Book of 1086 as 'Langelei', and there has been a church on the site since at least 1299 when Edward I was known to worship here when he lived in the village. It is here for all – to celebrate christenings, weddings and funerals – and open to all; we owe it to future generations to preserve and pass on its heritage. 'We look forward to supporting Avanti in building a truly outstanding Steiner school for the community' said Paul Kiss, Chair of RSSKL Trustees. There will be a further meeting at the school, 7.30pm on 26 February, at which Avanti will be seeking expression of interest from parents who wish to send their children to the new school.

In the meantime, the Kindergarten remains open for the Spring Term. At the Ofsted monitoring inspection in July 2018 it met all the safeguarding requirements and received a favourable report.

House of Commons recognition for Gary Lewis

Sir Mike Penning had tabled an Early Day Motion in the House of Commons, as follows:

That this House recognises the outstanding contribution to education in Kings Langley, Hemel Hempstead, Berkhamsted, and education throughout England made by Gary Lewis over a period of nearly 40 years, particularly at Kings Langley School, where he served as Head Teacher: notes his dedication and service to the children who attended the school, and his contribution to education throughout his career; further recognises his massive contribution to pupil development academically as well as in terms of personal achievement; further notes his skills and commitment will be sadly misses; and wishes him well in retirement.

The motion was also supported by Robert Halfon MP, chair of the Commons Select Committee on Education. A copy of the Hansard record of the EDM was presented to Gary Lewis, who will retire at the end of the current academic year after 17 years' service at the school



Mr Fisher provided a clear and compelling vision for the future of the school and was the students' and Governors' first choice and all are delighted with this appointment.



NHW information has moved on from the 'keep your house secure' messages. into highlighting the ever-increasing ways fraudsters are trying to part you from your money.



Watch out for STOLEN number STOLEN plate theft

There's a growing trend of the theft of number plates from vehicles. They are being stolen so the thief can put them on another vehicle and commit crimes that will not lead back to them.

The plates can be used for 'drive offs' (or 'bilking') where the offender fills their vehicle with fuel then drives off without paying (almost a daily event in some fuel stations), or to avoid the congestion charge in London, speeding/parking offences or just disguising a stolen vehicle. In some more serious cases they are used in kidnappings or robbery.

If your number plates are stolen please report this to the Police on the non-emergency number (101); If you receive fines or correspondence about road traffic offences, theft of fuel or other crimes as a result, you should return them immediately to the issuing authority explaining that your plates had been stolen and quoting the crime number which the police issued when you reported the theft.

How can you prevent the theft in the first place? Use security screws (designed to be easy to screw in, but almost impossible to unscrew) or a new type of plate that sticks (no screws visible) on to the vehicle and will shatter if someone tries to remove it. Some of these products are approved by *Sold Secure* – an independent test house specialising in approving security products through manual 'attack testing'.

And in case you are tempted, it is an offence to display the wrong vehicle registration mark on a vehicle with a maximum penalty of £1,000!
