Apart from two dozen bags of litter, our pickers returned with a folding trolley and a computer hard drive – without the computer. We had to leave the shopping trolley in situ. The most unusual item 'picked' was a dog that had slipped into the canal from Primrose Hill Park. The dog wasn't bagged.

Latest update on new Avanti School from the RSSKL

Trustees at RSSKL confirm that an agreement has been made with Avanti who are looking forward to opening a new school on the site in September 2019. To this end, a community meeting took place on Tuesday, 26 February.

Over 100 expressions of interest have already been registered for September. The meeting gave Avanti the opportunity to share their plans and thoughts around which year groups are likely to be opening in September, school fees, marketing, expected staff recruitment timelines and other questions the community had for them.

Over the coming months, the intention is that Avanti will hold regular workshop-style meetings where prospective parental and student feedback will be sought to help Avanti develop the school offering in time for a September opening.

'A new school, led by an experienced leadership team, with a robust understanding of the modern regulatory environment and willing to provide a Waldorf curriculum would be excellent news for many in the former school community and Kings Langley generally,' said a spokespersdon, adding 'The trustees very much welcome the support of the Kings Langley Village News, in sharing our vision of this exciting new Waldorf school project with the local community.'

Friends, relatives and Kings Langley FC players and supporters gathered at the Kings Langley v Staines Town match on 26 January to pay tribute to the memory of top club supporter and sponsor Matt Allcock, following his tragic death a week earlier in Weymouth after watching the club's away match there with friends.

Staines Town to Matt, with a 'pay what you want' entrance fee on the gate, and the 1.072 attendees at the match raised over £14,000 which has been donated to Matt's young family. Matt's two daughters bravely led the teams out, flanked by club officials, and a tribute was made by first team

secretary Derry Edgar as they lined up in front of the stand which Matt's company Heatfix sponsor.

Respect was shown elsewhere as Watford supporters placed a banner in honour of Matt in the away end at their FA Cup match with Newcastle United. and a minute's silence was observed in other local non-league grounds.

Matt had become a major part of the heartbeat of Kings Langley FC - as a supporter both home and away, as a sponsor, a member of the KLFC 200 club, and as a founder of the Kings Langley Supporters Forum. He will be greatly missed by all.

'Although for many it is a fun run for the youngsters', said Kate Chadwick, one of the organisers, 'it still has to be licensed which means UK Athletics require some very high standards for safety and organisation.' 'This may sound a fairly thankless task, but we operate a buddy system, meaning marshals are paired up to ensure no one is left alone,' Kate added. Pint pot ramming, Motorway Service Areas, All Saints Ceilidh

With the Government's apparent proposals to solve the housing crisis by developing the Green Belt, and recent local development activity, we've all got a bit jumpy about the prospect of any proposed development, even when it is genuinely minor or wouldn't really have a harmful effect, or where there are no grounds to object or refuse permission.

However, there is a controversial planning application in the north of the parish, at the bottom of the Shendish Estate driveway, where in my view the applicants are pushing their luck and there are fairly strong grounds for rejection. The proposal is to replace two bungalows with two three-storey blocks of eight flats, disguised as enormous semi-detached properties.

The objection I drafted for the Parish Council is available on Dacorum Borough Council's website and can be found online at *www.bit.ly/KLVN319a*. The gist of our objection is that the proposal would involve massive cramming/high density, would be unattractive and inappropriate for buildings of this kind, and would be laid out poorly, with the parking put in the wrong place and the buildings overbearing the adjacent properties.

DBC's planning officer is considering the application. If he recommends granting permission, the application will be referred to the Development Management Committee, at which point we will endeavour to advise as many residents as possible and do our utmost to persuade the committee to refuse permission.

Meanwhile, parish colleagues and I were invited to a consultation event at Maple Cross for a new online Motorway Service Area proposed between junctions 16/17 of the M25 (shown above). We are strongly opposed to the service area proposed immediately to the south of junction 20, and are hoping the junction 16/17 proposal would make that option unviable. Government policy prefers motorway service areas that are accessible from the motorway only, and Three Rivers DC still has not received a planning application for the junction 20 proposal, so maybe we can hope?

Finally, Ceilidhs (pronounced 'Kay-lees') are as misunderstood as their name is commonly mis-spelt. A Ceilidh is an utterly informal, fun social gathering where you enjoy easy Scottish dancing, without it mattering how agile you are, or anybody caring if you can dance or not. Nor do you have to be Scottish!

Village Plan update

Firstly, a huge 'Thank You' from Kings Langley Parish Council to everyone who has helped get our Parish Survey going.

To the library, Wayside Farm and Dalling & Co for hosting the 'Survey Stations'; to the *Village News* for inserting the survey and delivering to every household; to the volunteers who handed out leaflets, posted posters and generally encouraged everyone to get involved, and most of all to the 1,200 (yes, that's twelve hundred) residents, businesses and students of Kings Langley who answered our questionnaire to have their say in the future of the village.

We had given ourselves a target of 500 responses; it was in November 2017 that 800 residents came to the meeting at Kings Langley School about the Dacorum development proposals, but we didn't expect such a high level of engagement over a year later. Even 1,200 responses understates the real figure, as many households entered a single questionnaire for the whole family. Nearly half the households in the village have engaged with the survey. We heard from people aged 16 and those over 75, from people who have lived in the village for just a year and those who are residents of 30 years plus. It is very gratifying to see that so many of you are so engaged with the future of our village.

The results are being analysed for sharing with the Parish Council in March, but a sneak preview is that 96% of you believe that the 'sense of community' is important in defining the character of the village, and we thank you for demonstrating that sense of community through this survey.

In the Spring we will begin work on our Parish Plan which will identify key projects and action plans – we will give regular updates and opportunities for feedback as we progress. Thank you once again for your tremendous participation – so many people care about our village and this is what makes Kings Langley such a rewarding place to live.


Gary Ansell, Chair of the Kings Langley & District Residents Association (KL&DRA), comments on the latest Green Belt situation...

A new year and the Kings Langley & District Residents Association (KL&DRA) remains very active. We recently hosted a meeting with other Residents Associations across Three Rivers and Dacorum to discuss the Three Rivers Local Plan consultation, amid concerns that Local Plan sites identified by St Albans, Three Rivers and Dacorum are predominantly on Green Belt land.

All recognise the pressure local councils face but targeting Green Belt land for housing development without any supporting infrastructure will simply overload existing transport, education, health and other public services. We believe that our local authorities can cater for local housing demands, but do not see evidence that the problems of housing pressure from London can be adequately dealt with.

Hertfordshire County Council have recently identified that delivering the necessary infrastructure for the proposed housing developments will cost at least £5.7 billion, but that there is a £3.69 billion shortfall – so nearly two thirds of the money isn't there!

Three Rivers appear to have got it right by identifying small and large developments to meet their housing needs whereas Dacorum's approach is



to only include sites with a capacity of 10 plus units. They should focus on the quality and suitability of sites rather than on size alone. Kings Langley and its surrounding area in Dacorum has many smaller sites which could be brought forward in preference to large-scale house building in and around the village.

Every week there are planning applications seeking to build small scale housing developments in Dacorum on previously used land; instead of being looked at as 'windfall' sites by Dacorum's Planning Officers, they should be part of a revised strategy to build local communities, not destroy them. All the Residents Associations are demanding that common sense should prevail and that local authorities should not be forced into setting individual housing targets with no concern for their effects on neighbouring settlements and local infrastructure. This will become a major local election issue in May 2019 as large-scale housing developments on the Green Belt have no place in our villages.

Community Choir; all new for 2019!

Kings Langley Community Choir has begun 2019 with a surge of new members, new songs – including two by Queen – to rehearse for their repertoire, and three new performance venues.

The harmonies for *Somebody To Love* and *Crazy Little Thing Called Love* have excited the members even though the learning process is not yet complete, and to add to this there is a jazz/gospel arrangement of *I Wish I Knew How* and

a modern South African song recalling the anti-apartheid activist Steve Biko.

The Choir already has six confirmed performances for spring/summer, including first time appearances at St Lawrence Church, Bovingdon in May and West Wycombe Park in July. First however, the Choir is performing at St Mary's Church, Old Hemel, on Wednesday 10 April, in a concert also featuring the Gospel Arts Manna Choir. This is in support of Age UK Dacorum. The concert starts at 7:30pm and tickets are available on the door.

This new season comes after the

conclusion of a highly successful tenth anniversary year. The Choir has grown from 25 members when formed in 2008, to over 60 now. In that time the Choir has gained a reputation for a varied repertoire and rich harmonies that appeal to all ages. In addition to entertaining at many local events throughout the year, often in support of charities, there have been performances, in venues such as The Cadogan Hall, The Roundhouse and the Palace of Westminster. The last performance of 2019, just before Christmas, was at the Royal Festival Hall where the Choir entertained with a thirty-minute set as part of the Winter Chorus Festival.

Keep your Sunnyside Up!

In the burning heat of last summer, it was refreshing to stroll along the canal towpath towards Two Waters where the weeping willows dipped into the cool waters and all was peaceful and serene.

If the towpath improvements proposed in a previous issue of *Village News* come to pass, the experience will be even more attractive, especially if you turn aside into the Sunnyside Nurseries before B&Q looms into view. There you will find a good café, moderate prices for your coffee/tea and cake, plus a shop well stocked with ethically produced and fairly traded goods.

What makes this place special is that people with learning difficulties are sympathetically trained to become valued members of the Sunnyside community. Some trainees may well move into employment elsewhere.



As you leave, you may be tempted to stock your garden with plants grown in the surrounding greenhouses. Some readers may not be aware that the troughs of flowers which make our High Street so bright and beautiful come from these Sunnyside nurseries. Our enlightened Parish Council has commissioned the Trust to supply the plants which so enhance the attractions of our village.

So everybody wins – people with learning difficulties are helped and we all benefit from their efforts. This admirable charity deserves our thanks and support.

Did you know that choral singing really can make you happier? Singing releases endorphins, the brain's 'feel good' chemicals. Studies have revealed that, on average, choral singers rated their satisfaction with life higher than the general public and have a better psychological health than the 'normal' person.

Some of it is about the breathing – the exercise and aerobic activity of singing which promotes a good mood; The deeper breathing can help reduce anxiety, and the concentration required for singing reduces the stress of worrying about day to day problems. Learning new songs and harmonies keeps the brain active which can help fend off depression. Another reason is the social factor, the camaraderie and the feeling of being part of a group, and the commitment to that group that gets people out of the house each week!


New vicar for village parish church

Anyone for Beating the Bounds on 26 May?

Beating the Bounds is the ancient annual practice of walking around the Parish boundary on Rogation Sunday - the fifth Sunday after Easter.

Walk leader, Cllr Alan Anderson said, 'It's a primeval way of identifying where one lives, and leads further to questions about one's existence, hence it being done on Rogation Sunday.

'If anybody would like to do the walk this year, we will be leaving from outside All Saints Church at 11am on Sunday 26 May. It would help us to plan the event if you could let us know by Friday 24 May if you're attending, even if that's dependent on the day's weather.

'The walk passes through beautiful countryside, but it also involves a busy road junction, a padlocked gate and private land, so it has to be organised as a group walk. Proper footwear and provisions (including packed lunch) are needed, as the only facilities near the route are Sainsbury's after seven miles, and the whole walk is nine miles long."






Village quiz winners


