Born in the bedroom he slept in up to his last day, he never left Kings Langley in 68 years.

A true patriot, he was English and proud of it: you could guarantee that wherever he was there would be an England flag flying either at home or on his car or van. He was a character of the village who would guarantee to put a smile on your face whenever you met him. For over 45 years he ran a car body shop which has now been taken over by his son George.

On 29 March Kings Langley High Street was lined with friends waving flags and clapping as he passed through on his way to the crematorium in his muchloved red white and blue van *Gloria*; over 400 people attended the funeral. He has a plague on a bench in the High Street adorned with his name and an England flag.

# Climate Justice – local action

Residents of Kings Langley, Abbots Langley and Hemel Hempstead met on Kings Langley Common on 12 April to march through the village, standing in solidarity with thousands of students - striking across at least 60 UK locations and globally every month since February to demand faster and greater government action on climate change.

In Kings Langley the climate action group Transition In Kings (www. *transitioninkings.org*) has residents working together to build resilience to climate shocks, with a lack of support

from government policy so far. Strikes and marches are organised by the UK Student Climate Network (www.ukscn. org and www.fridaysforfuture. org) with action being taken by the younger generation, both at the local and national level. The next national Youth4Climate event will be on 24 May, and a local response is also planned.

# Say NO to Moto!

'The character of our village and the green spaces that make it somewhere we want to live are under threat as never before,' said Gary Ansell, Chair of Kings Langley & District Residents Association.

The latest threat, and it is a biggie, is the planning proposal for a Motorway Service Area on land adjacent to Junction 20 that has now been submitted by MOTO to Three Rivers District Council's Planning Department.' The site comprises greenfield land in the Green Belt, with access to the site via a new junction on the A41 between Langleybury Church and the M25 – NOT directly to and from the motorway.

Even without increased housing in current local development plans, the MOTO proposal has potential to cause massive traffic congestion through Kings Langley, Apsley, Hemel Hempstead, Hunton Bridge, Abbots Langley and the local area. Apart from the A41, all the other local roads are single or two lanes, many only accessible through height and width restricted bridges. In addition it will generate high levels of poor air quality from diesel fumes and noise issues, especially for the church and the primary school on the southern edge of the site.

# Parish Plan Update – Kings Langley Residents have their say

Kings Langley residents have had their say in the most detailed parish survey since 1991. A summary of the survey results was presented to the Parish Council in March.

Villagers were asked for their views on a range of issues that covered the character of the village, attitudes to future development and the High Street to traffic and parking and sustainability issues.

More than 1,100 people expressed their views: over 95% want Kings Langley to remain a village, 96% value the sense of community, and 98% consider the proximity to open space as a defining characteristic of the village.

The views on future development show the desire to protect the greenbelt is as strong as it was 18 months ago, with 95% rejecting greenbelt development, but 95% also accepted the need for new housing to be built on brownfield sites. 52% would prioritise starter homes for young people. Heavy traffic and congestion in the Parish were of the greatest concern to most residents.



John Morrish outlined the next steps when he told the Council 'We are still to fully analyse the hundreds of comments made by residents. We are waiting for the students of Kings Langley School to report back their findings, and the results of selected focus groups being run during April. We aim to have formal recommendations for a comprehensive Parish Plan back to the Council for their June meeting. This is just the beginning of building a plan that protects the heritage and history of our village whilst recognizing the development pressures the community faces.'

Over the years the High Street has changed enormously, and in fact today's High Street was not the original main road through the village – in mediaeval times the main route was parallel to the current High Street: along Rectory Lane, behind the Community Centre and across the playing fields to Church Lane. In the 18th and 19th centuries though, the current High Street was on the Sparrows Herne Turnpike Road from London to Aylesbury and the village provided a rest and supply point on the road north.

The current buildings on the High Street are a mix of ages, with the gable end front of The Cinnamon Lounge dating back to the 16th century and the newest building for the B&M care home not yet finished.

Businesses have come and gone – fifty years ago the High Street boasted no fewer than two petrol filling stations, two banks, two grocers and a greengrocer, a seed and plant shop, an antique shop, a baker, a hardware shop, a watchmaker, a printworks (printing the local newspaper *The Langley Times*), and a haberdashers, in addition to other businesses similar to those today. And there has been a butcher at number 4 since at least 1826!





Our clients often express their gratitude for our services, especially if they have a series of medical appointments and no family members near to take them to and fro. Our policy is to stay with our passengers while they wait to be seen, or if it's for a long consultation to arrange for a second driver to pick them up. could be free and can do as much or as little as suits their schedule.

Some drivers also help with the short journeys to the Tuesday Lunch Club and at one of the pre-Easter occasions everyone enjoyed a visit from the Scouts who arrived bearing gifts of daffodils. What a treat!



So far this year we have played various card games and answered quizzes but the highlight so far has been a visit from Rufus, a guide dog for the deaf.

Sandra Jackson has retired from the Parish Council after playing an active role in the team for over three years – they were most grateful for her energetic participation and wise counsel.

As the Parish Council has largely remained unchanged, so will its policies, which are:

- To Minimise Costs and the Parish Precept.
- To Oppose Green Belt Development.
- To Campaign for Local Public Services.
- To Support Village Events/Projects.




