Does Kings Langley Matter?

Perhaps you're already a member of facebook group Kings Langley Matters – or perhaps you're unaware of the online community of residents and fans who share village information, news and opinions!

Started five years ago, there are now 10,700 members posting 1,200 items, 7,000 comments and 15,000 'reactions' every month!

In 2014, after a fatal car crash outside her house. Chervl Hall and her neighbours raised concerns about road safety at a village Parish Council meeting and were encouraged to petition the County Council. Cheryl set up Kings Langley Matters as a facebook 'group' to spread the word and get signatures on the road safety petition, and it grew quickly. Through it she met Sarah West, who had facebook admin. experience and offered to help, and Anna Sapte joined the Admin Team about three years ago.

The purpose of the forum has evolved, and the content shaped by members over time. There are spin-off groups for lovers of cats and historic Kings Langley which have also been successful!

The Admin Team oversee posts to the group and try to keep the peace by removing anything offensive or ensuring people abide by the 'rules'. It can take just a few minutes or up to an hour a day but between the three of them, someone is usually available.

Read all about it - online! The KLM facebook page is kept up to the minute by the Admin Team of Sarah, Cherul and Anna

There are 'colourful' members of the forum, and guirky stories like the missing live chicken that turned up in a pub! Missing pets are among the most popular posts and runaway cats, dogs, horses (and ferrets!) have been reunited successfully. Discussions about shops and local services are numerous – it's the best place to find a recommendation for plumbers, gardeners or dog walkers!

Some topics trigger strong reactions - parking and fireworks are old favourites, and more recently political issues and green belt development generate heated discussions.

KLM makes people feel part of the community, it reaches many people quickly so is a great way to share reports of roadworks or

train problems. Local charities and community groups are promoted, and local photos are enjoyed, especially by those no longer in the village or unable to get out and about.

Cheryl, Sarah, and Anna received a Community Award in 2018 for their commitment to *KLM*! Who are they? Anna is a part time dental receptionist, volunteer for KL Good Neighbours and Lunch Club, and has Biggles, a black Labrador; Sarah is a registered veterinary nurse, is married, and has two children who go to school in the village; Cheryl lives near the High Street with her husband, daughter, German Shepherd and cat.

They are now great friends who would otherwise not have met and say the best thing is the people they meet through KLM. It's clear that Kings Langley does Matter to a great number of people!

Going away on holiday?

If you're leaving your home unoccupied, you can make it look like someone is home to help prevent being burgled by following these simple tips:

• **ask** trusted neighbours to keep an eye on your home and put bins back in place if they are being collected whilst you're away

• **close** and lock all windows and doors to your home, sheds, garages and outbuildings

 don't post updates on social media
 this can advertise the fact your home is unoccupied and you're away

• **use** timer switches for lighting inside or outside your home. Timer switches can be set to turn on at set times of the day or night, giving the appearance that someone is home

• **if you** aren't leaving your car at home, ask a neighbour or friend to park their car on your driveway cancel regular deliveries for things like milk or newspapers

• **move** valuable items such as laptops and mobile devices out of sight

• **ask** someone you trust to open and close your blinds or curtains and take in your newspapers and post, giving the appearance that someone is home.

Neighbourhood Watch in Kings Langley

Kings Langley was the first in the UK to get the designation of a Neighbourhood Watch village because we had an active scheme in every road! That is still true some years after this accolade, and we currently have nearly 900 NHW members in our village.

The benefits for being a member include:

• You may receive a discount on your household insurance;

• You can get emails from OWL messaging (Online Watch Link) making you aware of local incidents or current trends relating to online fraud.

• It is free! You can get stickers for your door and street signs to let criminals know that you're in a NHW area so you're less likely to be a victim of crime (according to College of Policing analysis).

Recently we sent an OWL message about the 'Nottingham Knockers' that

were in Kings Langley – if you saw this email you could choose not to open your door to these door step sellers, perhaps saving you from buying over-priced goods just to get rid of these callers.

Some roads in Kings Langley have more than 80% of residents being NHW members, while others have less than 20% sign-up. If neighbours are more alert for things going on in their road, crime is lower!

Kings Langley Parish Council – A Personal View from Sandra Jackson

I became a Parish Councillor shortly after the last local elections as a result of a casual vacancy, due to an elected Councillor having to relinquish their seat for personal reasons.

I was 'independent' – with no link to any political party, and I'm pleased to say that politics really doesn't matter in KLPC. All things done are for the best reasons for the village, its residents, and its businesses.

There are ten councillors representing the different wards in the village, and the boundary of the Parish Council is based on its historical area: From the M25 to Shendish, and from the canal to the dip on Chipperfield Road. Of course, people the 'other' side of the canal still consider themselves to be living in Kings Langley, but technically they are looked after by Abbots Langley PC.

Some of the highlights for me were:

• The commemorative events marking 100 years since the end of World War One, especially visiting the area in Northern France (*pictured above*) where Christopher Cox was awarded the Victoria Cross for his actions as a stretcher bearer.

To stand in the field in the wind and rain, where the horrors of a century ago took place, knowing I was going to soon be warm and dry but realising these brave men might at any moment have been breathing their last, was incredibly moving. • Helping to get *Kings Langley Village News* up and running by finding a great team to bring the idea to life and who will be keeping it going into the future. At the Parish Council's Vision event in 2016, it was clear that residents wanted a printed newsletter to replace the previous one that had lapsed.

- Being involved in some of the great things that the Parish Council organises: the Carnival, Gardens Competition, monthly litter picks, and the Christmas Lights event. These all help to foster a community feeling.
- Seeing hundreds turn up to KL School in December 2017 to hear about the proposals to turn our local Green Belt areas into housing and commercial developments. The depth of feeling was evident and gave the Parish Council a mandate to fight the proposals. We can't (and don't want to) stop all new building, but we want to protect to the best of our ability what makes our village a place we want to live in..

I didn't stand for re-election, but I can honestly say it was an honour serving on the Parish Council; working alongside other councillors, who don't get paid for the time they give to our village, was a pleasure, and eye-opening to see the projects and organisations they're involved in to keep Kings Langley a great place to live and work in..

'Thank You' from your DBC Councillors!

We would like to thank everybody who voted for us on 2 May to represent Kings Langley on Dacorum Borough Council. These are trying times in the world of politics, and we are particularly grateful that people took the time to vote, despite the nonsense happening nationally. was down from the typical level of about 48% to 35% which was an inevitable consequence of the national picture... however, we put a lot of time and effort into getting it right at a local level in our roles as councillors, and we are most grateful for the support we receive from villagers.



News from the Parish Council

A new parish council having been elected, there were two immediate items of good news...

Firstly, following months of discussions, the Grand Union Canal tributary waters to the south of Water Lane have finally been cleared of accumulated rubbish by the Canals and Rivers Trust volunteers. 'This is excellent news,' said Councillor John Morrish, 'going forward, we will get in touch with Countryside Management Service (CMS) to put a management plan in place for this area. We will also look to get all the trees cleared which have been cut down and left. Whilst this is not a parish council responsibility, it is potentially an area which could be made more attractive for residents.'

The Parish Council is responsible for the Village Garden, flower beds and High Street tubs. Over the last four

What Next? The Parish Council have accepted the report and will start working on the issues with the highest level of interest which they can do most to influence. These include housing priorities, environmental sustainability, traffic management in the High Street and recreational facilities, which will form part of the Parish Plan.

In addition, at its May Meeting the Parish Council agreed to go ahead with a formal Neighbourhood Plan for Kings Langley, which is a way of helping the local community have a specific say in the planning and development of the area, and is used to identify and protect important local green spaces and influence what new buildings should look like. While what Kings Langley wants has to work within the framework of Dacorum Borough Council's Local Plan, it will give us genuine influence on development. Having a formal Neighbourhood Plan gives the Parish Council a higher percentage of the Community Infrastructure Levy that developers have to pay to local communities, which will be spent on making the improvements to the village outlined in the Parish Plan.

The Parish Council thanks everyone in the village who took part in the survey and are very excited about taking the next steps on this path to getting a Neighbourhood Plan and being able to fund some of the great ideas from the Parish Plan. years a major project has made the Village Garden more of a relaxing and recreational area for residents of all ages. 'We've removed some of the larger and self-seeded trees to enable the planting of several hundred shrubs and flowers to provide variety and colour,' said Alan Johnson, who added 'Hats off to warden Paul Savin who has done an amazing job ensuring the plants have everything they need to thrive, despite a lengthy period of dry weather. Paul has also worked hard on the colourful displays such as those around the War Memorial and Great Park. Whilst there is always work to be done, and we would welcome any volunteers who would like to help, I think villagers can be very proud of the results.'



Three Rivers District Council and Berkhamsted Town Council have both recently declared climate emergencies, with Berkhamsted immediately setting up a working committee to ensure that all future local policy for their town is measured against the backdrop of climate breakdown and aiming for carbon neutrality in their community by 2030. Progressive!

Evidently there will be a motion on the Agenda of the next full Dacorum Borough Council meeting in July to debate declaring a climate emergency. Concerned residents should inform themselves and lobby our councillors to ensure this motion is not diluted and fully encompasses the scale and action required to ensure that Kings Langley is not left behind!


