# Yellow street piano

Mel Boda and Tom Billington of Electric Umbrella are behind the installation of a yellow street piano on the High Street in March – outside Dalling & Co.

You may recall that last year we featured them on our front cover as they won a Watford Audentior award for the work they do with their charity, providing music workshops for young adults with learning difficulties.

The piano will be bright yellow and it is being lovingly painted by village residents Caz Tully and Neli Christophorou in memory of their close friend and fellow resident Leti Preduca. Caz and Neli organised the MiniFest on Coniston Road in the summer of 2018 to raise money for Leti's breast cancer treatment. Very sadly Leti subsequently died, but the piano is being installed as her legacy - she loved community, friendship, and music.

Electric Umbrella have already installed a yellow street piano in Watford and, just like that one, the piano installation in Kings Langley High Street will be available for anyone to bash out a tune!

### Packed pews for charity recital

All Saints hosted a fabulous recital on Saturday 22 February in aid of the mission of All Saints raised over £1,600.



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The allotments in the beautiful space off Chipperfield Road are preserved as a site of special biodiversity. This land around the Priory has been producing food for over 700 years without, as far as we know, using chemical pesticides or artificial fertilisers.

The orchard provides an abundance of apples, and the annual apple day provides fresh organic apple juice for villagers. There are two areas of beehives which help the pollination of the wild plants and the fruit.

### Easter cards and more Ron Hitchcock RIP

Born in 1933, during the Second World War Ron Hitchcock was evacuated from his family in the East End of London to peaceful Hemel Hempstead.



He was welcomed by Albert and Sarah Smith who were without children and they soon treated Ron as their cherished son. While still keeping in regular touch with his London family he had the blessing of two sets of parents concerned for his welfare!

Ron's granddaughter Rebecca tells us 'Living with the Smiths changed Ron's life, and in 1956 they set him up with Langley Footwear in Kings Langley High Street which he ran for a number of years. He also met and fell in love with Eva, Albert's niece, and they were married in June 1958 following his National Service in the RAF.' After Langley Footwear ceased trading Eva worked in Stitches with its lovely selection of rolls of colourful fabrics and balls of wool.

In 1983 Ron and Eva's daughter Lorna had a serious accident in the High Street which many villagers will remember and Ron and Eva dedicated themselves to aiding her recovery.

Happily she survived and in recent years, following Eva's death in 2015, was a great help to her father. Ron always maintained that he loved living in Kings Langley and the last view of him which many of us had was him sitting on a seat outside St Lauras Home (where he'd gone for respite care) with the Country market in full flow and a group of carol singers reminding him that Christmas was coming!

The Village News team were saddened to hear of the passing of Patricia Collins, beloved wife of Parish Councillor Derek Collins. Derek was part of the group that instigated the start of this newspaper and we send our condolences to him and his family.

## Is 'Wendy's Wood' working?

A couple of years ago your Village News reported on a project devised by Wendy Bathurst to help resolve the problem of flooding in residents' gardens. In the light of the excessive rainfall and nationwide flooding of recent weeks. we thought it would be timely to see how the project was progressing.

Chipperfield Road residents Mark Sheldrake and Lawrence Parnell were happy to comment on the impact that the improved drainage at the rear of their houses has had on their back gardens – no longer under water.

'We are delighted with the solution,' said Mark, 'despite the recent downpours, water no longer runs off the land to flood our gardens'.

Lawrence agrees, saying 'we are very

grateful for Wendy's efforts to resolve the situation'.

Wendy (right) says 'I'm monitoring the pipe drainage from the pond and I'm pleased with the tree growth, although we've had a few losses and I've replaced about 30 saplings. Overall, the scheme is working well – and the fenced in area provides a haven for wildlife which would otherwise be at risk from predators. We now have Snipe, which are usually only wetlands birds, pheasants, skylarks and at least one kestrel safely nesting and raising their young amongst the saplings.'

Although taking time to fully flourish, the results are clear to see - Wendy's Wood has proved a success all round!









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It's time to get those running shoes out to train for the Kings Langley Puffaten road race (1.5k, 3k and 10k) which will take place on Sunday 28 June, starting and finishing at Kings Langley Primary School.

'Whilst I definitely wouldn't recommend running the 10k unless you have done a little training, the shorter races are an ideal opportunity to get a little exercise and give to charity,' explained race organiser Kate Chadwick. 'Any entrant can Gift Aid their entry fee and all profits go to local charities.'

There has been a trend over the last couple of years for runners to leave entering the race until the day itself, leading to increased queues at the late

entry desk and then having to sprint to the start line. Race director Alan Johnson tells us there aren't enough volunteers to increase manpower on this desk and the race has to start on time so, if you're planning on entering, please do help to move things along by signing up beforehand!

Kings Langley Football Club have started 2020 with a bang – unbeaten in their first eight league games since New Year's Day, taking 20 out of a possible 24 league points.

It started away at Hitchin with a late winner and second goal of the season for Ex-Watford star Lloyd Doyley. The excellent run has been assisted by the return to the club of striker Harry Crawford (pictured below) and the new signing of ex-Watford player Will Hoskins. Both add more experience to a team that is now looking evenly strong.

As we go to press they are only five points off of the play-offs, with two games in hand over some contenders, bringing a complete change to the season going into the last two months – a phenomenal turn around under Chris Cummins

The run of wins has been against clubs like Nuneaton Borough and Stratford Town – from large towns with considerably larger budgets – proof of how well our village team have come on.

Another big victory against top of the league Bromsgrove Sporting (3-1) was on the anniversary of the sad passing of club number one fan Matty Allcock. The teams for the match were led out by Matty's family and the match was preceded by a minute's applause. Matty would have loved Harry Crawford's hattrick on the day.

With 11 games left from March until the last game of the season, there are six home games to play; against Redditch United (21 March), Tamworth (4 April), St Ives (11 April), Alvenchurch (18 April), and two others to be arranged. ## Change for the Community Library

The 2020 events programme began with health and fitness event Eat. Dance, Shine by local author and teacher Michelle Kaye.

Michelle (pictured right) gave an informative and inspirational presentation aimed at living better and more healthily, something many promise to do at this time of year! Samples of healthy drinks and snacks, recipe cards and exercise routines were all part of the session. There's a copy of Michelle's book in the library to borrow, well worth a read!

The February event was a repeat of *Snapshots through Time* by the Kings Langley Local History and Museum Society – another sell-out and very well received. The society is very fortunate to have a group of dedicated archivists with access to many local resources, and their members generously share their extensive knowledge and enthusiasm. This event enabled the inaugural use of the new audio-visual equipment (pictured) obtained through library fundraising and the generous grants from the Parish Council, Kings Langley Carnival, Hertfordshire Community Libraries Forum, and from local County Councillor Richard Roberts through his locality fund.

By the time you read this the library should be about to reopen after a three-week closure for essential electrical upgrade works – hopefully this has not caused inconvenience and the staff hope to see you all in the library again soon. The library now boasts a colour photocopier which can copy up to A3 size – the high-quality copying service is available for use by all, please spread the word.

On 25 March the Community Library Volunteer organisation holds its Annual General Meeting in the library. All papers for the meeting are available in the library to read in advance. Library members are welcome to attend, and feedback and ideas to help develop the library in line with community needs and preferences are welcomed.

2020 will bring significant change to the running of all Hertfordshire libraries; from 1 April the new



charitable organisation Libraries for Life will take over from Herts County Council. The staff will transfer across to the new organisation, so you won't see any difference when you visit the library and there are no major changes anticipated in the short term.

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# Harold Taylor - 90 and counting!

Harold is a familiar figure in Kings Langley. He was born on 1 January 1930, an only son with six sisters, on Hornsey's Coldfall Estate. When war broke out they stayed put, the council installing an Anderson shelter at the end of each garden. They spent 341 nights in it in 1940! He passed the 11+ and attended the Stationers' Company's School, which he left aged 16.

The Methodist Church was a formative influence in his teens and twenties through the thriving Muswell Hill church, and he was accredited as a local preacher in 1950 conducting services regularly around the Highgate circuit and beyond.

After two years' National Service in the Royal Navy (which he did not enjoy) he trained as a teacher in History and Divinity at Westminster Training College and subsequently spent several years teaching in secondary schools in North London, qualifying by private study for the London BD (Bachelor of Divinity) and Master of Philosophy degrees whilst working full-time as a teacher. 'It was a hard slog,' he says.

He married in 1959 at the Muswell Hill Methodist Church, and he and his wife settled into their first home in Edgware with Alison arriving in 1963. Didsbury College in Manchester was his next move as a college lecturer where he taught Religious Studies up to graduate level. Bridget and Christopher were born there.

After a spell as Gloucestershire County Humanities Adviser, in 1976 he was appointed Principal Education Adviser (subsequently Assistant Director of Education) in the London Borough of Harrow, and the family moved to its current home in Kings Langley. 11 years later he took early retirement and, with the attractive prospect of many active years ahead, embarked upon several voluntary jobs.

The first was with Citizens Advice, an association lasting 22 years, for the last half of which he dealt exclusively with telephone callers and was therefore dubbed 'the voice of Abbots Langley'. The second, and most satisfying job he says, has been a central involvement in the work of Christian Aid in Kings Langley, first as secretary, which

involved, among many other projects, setting up fundraising campaigns and publications, and then as Chair for ten years. He remains very active in all their work and is passionate about it. When the time comes, he has directed that his ashes should be buried in a red Christian Aid bucket!

Harold responded to an appeal for help with young offenders at Bovingdon Prison which led to five years as a member of the Parole Board. He left it with a sense of the futility of our penal system. He was also involved in the early establishment of DENS when it was a church-based night shelter for the homeless, where guests could get hot meals and a bed for a few nights.

He has for 25 years been a volunteer with the National Trust – as a tour guide and shop assistant at Sutton House in Hackney and later at Fenton House in Hampstead, for which he has received a long service award. Other voluntary work has included several years as chairman of the Kings Langley Charities which distributes occasional help to people in need, and ten years as chair of Good Neighbours, in which capacity he shared in providing transport to medical and other appointments. He also helped to launch the *Village News* as its secretary.

Retirement provided the opportunity to study part-time for a Diploma in Art History at Birkbeck College, specialising in medieval art and architecture, graduating cum laude.

One of his great regrets is that he never received a decent musical education. He has tried to compensate for this deficiency by building up a large collection of recorded music, with special emphasis on the music of J.S.Bach. He has developed a love of gardening over the past few years and loves spending time with his children and four splendid grandsons.

# News from the Parish Pump

With spring just around the corner, the question on everyone's lips is 'What happened to the tulip tree in the Village Garden?'

Having flowered twice in 2019 it may have seemed the unkindest cut of all to pollard it (remove the branches). However, councils have a responsibility to regularly survey the trees for which they are responsible to ensure they are safe. 'The parish council is responsible for trees in the Village Garden and in the Sunderland's Yard allotments.' explained Village Warden Paul Savin. 'So we will be working to a plan over the next few years to ensure, as far as is possible, that the trees are safe and healthy.' The trees in other public spaces are the responsibility of Dacorum Borough Council.

On a welcome note, a local nurseryman has donated more shrubs to the Village Garden. 'We are very grateful to Dave and Jill for their ongoing support' added Paul, 'it means the villagers lending a hand on the first Friday in February, including Peter Faulkner and Ann Johnson, were able to add a touch more colour at a fairly monochrome time of year.'

Earlier this year Father James
McDonald of All Saints' Church sought
the council's support for his proposal
to walk a donkey along the High Street
on Palm Sunday (5 April) to celebrate
the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. The
intention is to walk the short distance
from Dalling & Co to the church – parish
councillors agreed to accompany the

procession in the regulation uniform for such activities – high visibility vests. 'Easter is about more than chocolate eggs' said Derek Collins, 'This is a lovely way of reminding local people about this most celebrated Christian festival.'

This year is Hertfordshire Year of Culture, showcasing the county as one of creative and cultural opportunity and local artist Abu Jafar approached the parish council about supporting an exhibition of painting, sculpture, installations, artist talks, and workshops by four local artists: Abu Jafar, Dick Onians, Ewa Wawrzyniak, and Graham Boyd.

'All four artists live in Kings Langley and Chipperfield and exhibit in some of the most important galleries, museums and sculpture parks here and abroad,' said Alan Johnson. 'Given the scale of what was proposed, it was important to find a suitable venue.' The council have put Abu in touch with Langley Hill School as the venue, and they are working on sourcing Arts Council funding for the exhibition with the help of the county's Year of Culture team.

# Dacorum's environmental portfolio

Appointed as Dacorum Borough Council's portfolio holder for Environmental Services last May, Alan Anderson has familiarised himself with the 'inner workings' and is now considering how they could be improved – not necessarily a straightforward task.

He says the trickiest bit has been changing the arrangement for refuse collection calendars and trying to communicate to people without internet access that they can phone the council to get a calendar sent to them. It was on the front page of Dacorum Digest (delivered to every house in the borough) but unfortunately some people didn't read that!



Much of his work has focused on little things, like banning the launch of harmful sky lanterns from council property and prosecuting fly-tippers. But there have been the big things too; although refuse disposal isn't their responsibility, Dacorum is obviously heavily involved, and this has become a big issue.

Alan is lobbying Herts County Council to keep trying to establish a refuse processing facility in the county, so they can stop carting truckloads of rubbish long distances out of the county, and in addition tackle the issue that some of our dry recyclables are not actually recycled but are exported overseas by resellers. Bizarrely money is not the problem, the real issue is that nobody wants a refuse processing facility in their backyard!

The other 'biggest' issue is the climate change agenda. Together with the Leader of the Council, Alan is focused on practical action that isn't counterproductive, including a programme to plant 1,000 trees on public land in the borough.

## Spring Concert


Chipperfield Choral's Spring Concert includes performances of *The Music Makers* by Elgar and Mozart's *Vespers*.

### Vehicle security from PCSO Ian Martin

Analysis of crime trends has shown that criminals are changing their methods of theft in the light of advances in vehicle electronics, on board computer and Wi Fi systems.

Here are the top Operation Chariot tips to help you protect your vehicle and the property within it:

- Lock the doors and shut the windows and sunroof whenever you leave your vehicle unattended.
- Always take the keys out of the ignition even if you're just paying for fuel, or popping back into your home to get something.
- Be aware of your keys. Don't leave them lying around, visible or in pockets in changing rooms where they could be taken. Don't leave them visible on a windowsill in your home or near the front door, where they could be 'hooked' through the letterbox.
- Never leave any valuables in your vehicle – and keep all possessions out
- Remove your sat nav and its holder, and wipe away any suction marks on the windscreen.
- Never leave vehicle documents in your car.
- Use an approved steering lock or gear clamp, and set your immobiliser and alarm if you have them.
- Consider buying locking screws kits to secure number plates which are targeted by criminals.
- Register your stereo, laptop, sat nav and any other property on the free online property database www. immobilise.com. It only takes a few minutes and could help police trace your property if it's lost or stolen.



- If you advertise your vehicle for sale on an online web site, ensure the number plates are covered over when photographed to avoid cloning of its identity.
- Fit a dual band tracking device that works on VHF/UHF and GPS to ensure that one tracking system is still functioning if criminals use GPS blocking techniques to avoid detection. Purchase devices to 'Thatcham' and 'SBD' approval to combat this type of vehicle theft, as vehicles equipped with a tracking device are often promptly recovered.
